# A STATEMENT FROM WINCHESTER'S DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC SAFETY

\* \* \* \*

The emergency has arrived. We are at war. Let us now face the situation with calmness, clear thinking, and intelligent action.

Winchester is not yet organized to the extent planned. There is still a place for anyone who wishes to volunteer for service, and much intensive training is necessary for the proper functioning of the complete organization. However, there are about 650 men and women who through knowledge recently acquired by study and training are now qualified to aid in the protection of life and property should any extreme emergency occur in the town.

About 275 Air Raid Wardens have just completed their school course and will be immediately assigned to duty. Another group will be started soon. One hundred Auxiliary Police and Firemen are now receiving instructions in their duties. Several hundred men and women have passed the Red Cross First Aid Course. Over 100 volunteer ambulance drivers are enrolled, and the Red Cross Motor Corps is fully organized and working. Many women are studying emergency feeding in our Nutrition course and plans for temporary shelter and additional hospital service have been fully approved.

A list of available trucks is on file. The public services are prepared to meet any emergency. The Boy Scout courier service is organized. A Disaster Information Service has been established.

All town departments are aware of the necessity for quick action and are ready to assist whenever needed.

The volunteer army observers are on duty at their posts continually night and day. The Report Center is fully equipped with telephones, charts, maps, and official message blanks and is now "on the alert" 24 hours a day on orders from the U. S. Army. The first test-call from the Army came in at 10:20 Monday night, Winchester answered, "we are ready."



The Winchester Chapter will have six Emergency Ambulances ready for service in Winchester-the above items issued by the American Red Cross, First Corps Area, Disaster Field Office, are for five Red Cross Emergency Ambulances.

Emergency ambulances are designed to provide adequate means of transportation for civilians injured in peace time or war caused disaster. During peace time disasters the Emergency Ambulance Units are directly responsible to the Medical Staff of the Disaster Committee and may also be used under the direction of the Rescue and Transportation Committee, depending upon the circumstances. During war caused disasters, the Units are subject to call and direction by the chief Air Raid Warden.

Memorable among the brief, but stirring, speeches were these highlights:


GOVERNOR SALTONSTALL—We've got to fight to maintain the front lines. Therefore we must have a healthy, happy, prepared, united community.

Interpretation of the law regarding inside and outside store lighting is covered in the Governor's Executive Order No. 3, dated Jan, 8th:

"Until further order, rule or regulation all illuminated signs, flood lighting, store window lighting or an other display lighting visible from the outside shall be extinguished from sunset to sunrise unless the owner or person in control thereof has made arrangements satisfactory to the Massachusetts Committee on Public Safety whereby such lights shall be turned off immediately when the signal for a blackout is given."

In other words persons or owners in control must make satisfactory arrangements with James W. Blackham. Blackout Officer for Winchester whereby any illuminated signs, flood lighting, store windows lighting og other display lighting shall be turned off immediately when the signal for black out is given; otherwise such lights must be extinguished from sunset to sunrise.


The sole responsibility lies with the owner, or person in control of the lights.

The Health and Social Service Divisions heretofore functioning as two separate groups are now combined into one, to be known as the Health and Social Service Division.

Except those who registered Oct. 16, 1940 or July 1, 1941.

### WHERE TO REGISTER

Registration may be accomplished in the towns in which the Registrant lives, as well as in any town or city in the United States. The Registrants should be careful to give their home address properly when registering out of their home town.









#### How to Distinguish Nationality of Aircraft

Civilian air raid spotters will have no difficulty distinguishing Axis planes from those of the United Nations if they memorize the markings illustrated above. American and British planes have designs of red, white and blue, and Russia has a red star. Watchers on the southern border occasionally may see the red triangle of Mexico. Axis raiders are easily spotted through the familiar black cross and swastika of Germany, the round red rising sun emblem of Japan and the Roman fasces insignia borne by Italian planes.

#### CONGRESSIONAL MEDAL OF HONOR

This, the highest decoration awarded by the U. S. Government, can be given to any officer or enlisted man of the United States Army who shall "in action involving actual conflict with an enemy distinguish himself conspicuously by his gallantry and intrepedity at the risk of his life, above and beyond the call to duty." It was first authorized by act of Congress in 1862, and presented "in the name of Congress": hence the frequent allusion to it as the "Congressional Medal."

The present design was adopted in 1904. A bronze five-pointed star, surrounded by a laurel wreath in green enamel, suspended by two links from a bronze bar bearing the inscription "Valor." and surmounted by an eagle. In the center of the star is the head of Minerva surrounded by the inscription "United States of America." Each ray of the star bears an oak leaf in green enamel. On the reverse of the medal is engraved the name of the recipient. It may be worn with a neck band. The ribbon is of 13 white stars arranged in the light blue watered silk. Midway form of a triple chevron.

#### ORDER FOR TEST BLACKOUT MARCH 11TH 9:30 P. M. - 9:50 P. M.

Under the authority conferred by Executive Order No. 3 promulgated by Leverett Saltonstall, Governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, and dated January 8, 1942 and with the approval of the Controller of Area V-B, it is hereby ordered that at 9:30 P. M. on March 11, 1942, occupants of all premises or parts of premises, public and private, in the Town of Winchester shall extinguish all lights or darken the premises so that no light is visible from the outside.

The signal for the test blackout shall be the extinguishment of the street lights. the street lights. The blackout shall remain in effect until the street lights are turned on at 9:50 P. M.

#### **BLACKOUT REGULATIONS**

Smoking or lighting matches outdoors during the blackout is forbidden.

Lights may be left on in rooms which have previously been equipped for use during a blackout in such manner that no light whatsoever shall be visible from the outside. The windows and entrances to such equipped rooms or places shall be covered with heavy draperies, curtains, heavy paper, board or black obscuration paint, so that no light may be visible from the outside. Skylights shall be specially obscured on the outside to prevent reflection of light.

All outside lights, including lights for work being done in the open, shall be extinguished immediately on the giving of the signal for the test blackout. All outside activity which involves fire, or in any way creates or displays a source of light, shall cease.

No vehicle shall be operated on any way or street, public or

private during the blackout except such vehicles as are necessary for the services essential to civilian defense, or for the preservation

of life or property.

At 9:30 P. M., March 11, 1942, the operators of vehicles other than emergency vehicles shall immediately drive to the side of the road or curb at the first opportunity and stop. The operators of vehicles shall extinguish the lights thereon. The operators of such vehicles shall not park at intersections, hydrants, police stations, fire stations or hospitals. If practical, the operators of such vehicles shall drive the same entirely off the travelled portions of the road or highway. Vehicles already parked at the curb, in parking places or garages shall be left where they are unless ordered or permitted to be moved by the police.

#### BLACKOUT RULES FOR THE HOMES

Remain indoors if possible. By sure that the children are kept

off the streets.

Put out ALL lights except in rooms effectively blacked out. Have interior lights so arranged or shaded that they do not

shine directly on any window or other opening or their coverings. Do not make unnecessary telephone calls during the Blackout period.

Cover your radio dial if the instrument is turned on in an unlighted room that is not blacked out. Keep off the streets.

#### THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA— HOW TO RESPECT AND DISPLAY IT



#### DISTINGUISHED-SERVICE MEDAL

The Distinguished-Service Medal is awarded to persons who, while serving in any capacity with the Army of the United States, distinguish themselves by exceptionally meritorious services to the Government in duty of great responsibility, and to all enlisted men of the Army to whom the certificate of merit had been granted under the conditions of previously existing law. It was instituted in 1918.

On the medal the coat of arms of the United States in bronze is surrounded by a circle of dark blue enamel bearing the inscription "For Distinguished Service." On the reverse is a scroll for the name of the recipient. It is suspended by a bar from a watered-silk ribbon, composed of a band of scarlet, a stripe of dark blue, a band of white, a stripe of dark blue, and a band of scarlet.



#### SOLDIER'S MEDAL

The Act of Congress approved July 2, 1926, authorized a medal to be known as the Soldier's Medal, and provided that the medal may be presented to persons who, while serving in any capacity with the Army of the United States shall hereafter distinguish themselves by heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy.

#### 500 MORE MEN AND WOMEN WARDENS NEEDED NOW

It is apparent that any efficient plan for the proper functioning of the Winchester Defense Corps must of necessity provide for both day and night groups. This is particularly true of the A. R. P. Organization which must go into action quickly and effectively if our other defense units are to carry out their responsibilities.

It is therefore imperative that a day time organization be set up at once without further delay in order that the town be pro-

tected adequately at all times.

The personnel of each Warden's Post should consist of four persons—two for night duty and two for day duty. However for the present and until there are enough wardens to carry out the plan, and until further orders are issued, all wardens, (when they are in Winchester) should respond to all emergencies both practice and real.

As the day time group will be made up largely of women, each Division Warden and Section Warden will immediately appoint at least one woman Deputy to assist in the selection and organizing of the Women Deputy Post Wardens and to be re-

sponsible for the emergency day time mobilization.

Women Wardens who are usually in Winchester during the day will be released from night duty and assigned to the day time group. There are now many women serving as Wardens who are in business or in a profession and can only serve at night. They may still be retained for night duty. Perhaps there are other women who would like to serve both day and night. These should be assigned to the day time group, but may be used at night in an extreme emergency. However the personnel of each Post should consist of four or more persons.

More men Deputy Post Wardens must be appointed immediately to replace the women who have been assigned to day duty and to fill present vacancies. At the same time more women will be needed to augment the present day time group. At least 500 more men and women are necessary at once if the full quota is to

be reached.

These new appointees (if they have not already attended a school) should enroll in the Fourth A. R. P. School starting May 18 and ending June 2. They need not take the First Aid Course until fall if they do not wish to.

# DIM OUT

In accordance with regulations governing the control of seacoast lighting issued by Headquarters First Corps Area, May 2, 1942, and in conformity with information issued by the Massachusetts Committee on Public Safety, the Town of Winchester will be governed by the following rules effective at once:

- 1. All advertising and display signs and lights must be permanently extinguished.
- 2. All display lighting in shop and store windows must be reduced to the maximum extent consistent with protection from burglary.
- All outside lights, excluding street lights, must be shielded or extinguished, and all skylights which throw direct light skyward must be diminished.
- 4. All street lights must be shielded from skyward as funds and materials for this work can be obtained. The wattage of unshielded street lights should be reduced where practical. All unshielded street lights which are found to be unneccessary for public safety should be extinguished.

These regulations apply to all plants not government owned or operated, whether or not those plants are engaged in war production, and compliance with these regulations will be exacted to the maximum extent compatible with the continuance of full production.

Changes in these regulations may be made from time to time as a result of inspection and experience.





#### THE DISTINGUISHED FLYING CROSS

The Distinguished Flying Cross is awarded to any person, who, while serving in any capacity with the Army Air Corps of the United States, including the National Guard and the Organized Reserves, subsequent to April 6, 1917, has distinguished himself or shall distinguish himself by heroism or extraordinary achievement, while participating in an aerial flight.

# Changed Delivery Schedules

By June 1st the O. D. T. (Office of Defense Transportation) expects us to make such readjustments in our delivery service as will effect a further saving of 25 per cent beyond that already made under the order of April 20th.

To meet these government requirements which have for their object the extension of the life of trucks and a saving of tires and gasoline, we are making numerous changes in our delivery schedule which will be explained by our routemen.



### Official U. S. Treasury War Bond Quotas for August



Washington, D. C., August 5.—While maintaining a tentative annual level of twelve billion dollars as its goal, the Treasury Department today fixed the August quota for the sale of War Bonds at \$815,000,000 as shown by the accompanying map by states.

In lowering the quota from a billion dollars in July to \$815,000,000 in August, the Treasury has given recognition to certain factors which may be expected to result in variations in sales over the 12-month period, such as the seasonal character of farm income.

These factors have been taken into account in determining each state's share for the national quota for August and will be given consideration in fixing quotas for subsequent months.

In addition to the state quotas as set out in the map there is a federal payroll allotment quota of \$9.750.000 and territorial quotas as follows: Alaska, \$760.000; Canal Zone, \$213,000; Hawaii, \$4,800,000; Puerto Rico, \$440,000 and the Virgin Islands, \$17,000.
