# New Air Raid Signals

#### ORDERED BY THE ARMY

#### EFFECTIVE 12:01 A. M. FEB. 17, 1943

When you hear ONE LONG STEADY BLAST on the air raid sirens and factory whistles, it means that enemy planes probably are coming our way.

All Defense Units will mobilize quickly.

Immediately blackout all lights.

If you are in an automobile, be sure your lights are on low beam, proceed with caution, and start thinking about getting to a safe place.

If you are walking, continue but start thinking about where

you will go if a raid signal follows.

When you hear a SERIES OF SHORT BLASTS on the air raid sirens and whistles, it means enemy planes are overhead.

Again be sure all lights are blacked out.

If you are riding in an automobile, stop by the side of the road and turn off all lights. If there is an air raid shelter near, get out and go into the shelter.

If you are walking, wer into a shelter as quickly as possible.

The warden on the post will direct you.

When the airplanes are no longer overhead, you will again hear ONE STEADY BLAST. This does NOT mean "All Clear.

Enemy planes may return. Keep alert. All Defense Units must remain on duty. All lights except automobile lights must be kept blacked out.

If you were in your automobile prior to the air raid alarm, you may proceed slowly. If you were walking you may resume

Until further notice the only "All Clean" signal will be the switching on of street lights or an announcement transmitted by radio, telephone, police, wardens, couriers, or other method:,

#### STATE BLACKOUT TEST

SUNDAY, FEB. 28

The First Service Command of the Army has ordered a State Blackout test on Sunday, Feb. 28 from 7:55 p. m. to 8:30 p. m.

One long blast of the sirens and whistles at 7:55 will be the first warning. All lights including hand operated street lights (but not centrally controlled street lights) must be blacked out. Traffic may continue until the sounding of a series of short blasts at 8:10. Then all traffic with the exception of emergency vehicles must be stopped. All street lights will be extinguished. At 8:29 another long blast will be sounded permitting resumption of traffic and the lighting of street lights (other than hand operated lights).

Houses and other buildings must remain blacked out until notified by wardens or police,

All Defense Units must report at their Posts and remain until released by Headquarters staff.





# War Restrictions on Telephone Service



All telephone service installed or reconnected on and after April 15th will be on a temporary basis, according to a War Production Board order, dated March 25, 1943.

This means that in the case of such temporary services, the Telephone Company may find it necessary to change a customer's grade of service (for example, as from a private to a party line), or to remove the telephone entirely. Naturally, such action would generally be taken only if it became necessary to recover facilities required for essential needs of persons in direct defense, or responsible for public welfare or security.

The order also limits the number of telephones that may be installed within certain areas. This automatically stops installations in such areas as may have reached already the prescribed limit of telephones. As telephones now in service in such areas are removed, new installations may replace them from waiting lists which will be maintained.

Further installation, or reconnection, of residence extensions is prohibited, and when an instrument on the premises cannot be reconnected, it will be necessary to remove it.

Further restrictions are imposed on the installation of dial switchboards and teletypewriters.

These restrictions will inconvenience some people. It will be part of their sacrifice for Victory. If you should be affected, we know we shall have your understanding co-operation as we continue our own effort to hold telephone service to the highest possible standard.





We gave you fine quality cleansing. You reciprocated by making us happy to serve the most kindly, friendly clientelle any concern ever had the pleasure to serve.



There will be a surprise Air Raid Test for Region 5 sometime during the 13-day period beginning at midnight Sunday, Sept. 12.

All Winchester Defense units should be on alert and prepared for full mobilization when the signal sounds.

On a long blast, the Defense personnel should report at their posts and all lights except those on automobiles should be extinguished. Traffic may continue,

When the series of short blasts sound, all traffic must stop, all civilians, except defense personnel must be in doors, and automobile lights must be off. Emergency Defense vehicles may proceed slowly with lights.

A second long blast permits traffic to resume, but lights except those on automobiles must remain extinguished.



#### AIR RAID TEST OCTOBER 21

There will be a Regional Blackout and Air Raid practice exercise Thursday evening, Oct. 21. The first audible signal (one long blast lasting 1½ minutes) will be sounded about 8.35 p. m. All Defense personnel will mobilize on this signal. All lights shall be extinguished, but traffic may continue.

The second audible signal (a series of short blasts for two minutes) will be sounded about 8.55. On this ignal all traffic except emergency vehicles shall stop. All pedestrians shall seek shelter and all lights must be extinguished.

The third signal (one long blast for about 1½ minutes) will sound about 9.05. On this signal traffic may resume, but all lights must remain out.

Personnel not involved in an incident may be dismissed on the "all clear" but others should remain on duty until incidents have been cleared.





 WARNING SIGNAL—STEADY LONG BLAST, (1½ MIN-UTES) TIME: ABOUT 8:50 P. M.

a. Street lights turned out.

- b. All house and other building lights visible from outdoors turned out or blacked out.
  - c. All plants except those doing war production work black out
- d. Automobiles continue to travel with lights on low beam. (This does not mean parking lights).
- e. Pedestrians may move but should keep an eye out for nearest available shelter when the ALARM signal is sounded.

f. Workers may remain at their jobs.

- g. All branches of Civilian Defense Mobilize.
- ALARM SIGNAL—SERIES OF SHORT BLASTS. (2 MIN-UTES). TIME: ABOUT 9:05 P. M.
- a. All traffic must stop except vehicles carrying Civilian Defense pennants and vehicles belonging to the Army, Navy, State Guard, Police, Fire, etc., generally referred to as emergency vehicles. These may continue with lights on low beam and should move without challenge.
- b. All plants doing war production work, must black out for the entire ten minute ALARM period.
  - c. Buses will stop and extinguish all lights.
- d. Members of the Federal and State Armed Forces, F. B. I. agents, Police personnel, essential Public Utilities personnel, private Plant Guards, under orders to report to their stations in case of an alert must be allowed to proceed during the ALARM period upon proper identification.
- e. All other persons, except authorized Civilian Defense personnel on duty and wearing their proper armbands, should immediately take shelter during this period.
- SPECIAL NOTE: The handling of vehicular traffic and buses is the responsibility of the Police and Auxiliary Police and NOT THAT OF THE WARDENS.
- WARNING SIGNAL—STEADY LONG BLASTS. (1½ MIN-UTES). TIME: ABOUT 9:15 P. M.
- a. All lights including street lights, house lights, store lights and those in office buildings continue out.

(See "F" below for industrial plants).

 b. Pedestrians and workers by leave their shelters and resume activities.

c. Householders remain indoors.

d. All automobiles may resume driving with lights on low beam, (not parking lights).

e. All civilian defense remains mobilized.







## BULLETIN TO CANNERS Boil Your Jar Rubbers

Jar rubbers are now made from reclaimed and synthetic rubber. Last year complaints were made that these rubber rings made off-flavors in the products. Tests conducted by the State College at Amherst indicate that preboiling is necessary if housewives would avoid this rubber flavor.

Here is the procedure: Scrub rubber rings in hot soapy water. Then boil ten minutes in water and baking soda. Allow one tablespoon of baking soda to each quart of water and have one quart of water for each dozen rings. Rinse well after boiling. Be sure to start with fresh water and soda for each lot of rings.





ANDY DEVINE

Endorsing the national Elks War Commission's "Write 'em a letter" campaign, which is being supported by 650,000 members of the B. P. O. Elks throughout the nation, star Andy Devine, in a letter to James R. Nicholson, chrisman of the Commission, writes: "When we pray for the boys in the service, only we know that we are thinking of them, but when we write them, they know we are thinking of them."

Together with other stars of screen, stage and radio, who have also visited theatres of war in Europe, Africa and islands in the Pacific Ocean, Andy Devine urges that every one on the homefront write—frequently—to the members of our armed forces overseas. 

#### To the Citizens of Winchester

Now that the war with Germany is ended, the state authorities feel that there is no further need for an air raid defense organization, consequently most of the units of Civilian Defense will now be completely demobilized.

The units which will still remain active are the Auxiliary Police, Auxiliary Firemen, Nurses' Aides, and all War Services including of course Salvage and the Block Leaders. Headquarters at 572 Main Street will still be maintained.

The efficient communication and air raid alarm system is now being dismantled and the Report Center closed. The several sirens set up in various parts of the Town are being taken down. The supplies and equipment in the Medical Depots will be turned over to other organizations which have need for them.

The protective units of Civilian Defense in Winchester were never called upon to act in a war emergency. Nevertheless they were organized and ready to act if the need arose, and the citizens of the Town felt much more secure because of their existence.

The Public Safety Committee is grateful to all members of these units for their co-operation, their loyalty, and their unselfish service, and takes the opportunity to publicly express its appreciation to them.

#### DEFINITIONS OF DRAFT CLASSIFICATIONS

Class 1A: Available for military service.

Class 1A-O: Available for noncombatant military service.

Class 1C: Member of land or naval forces.

Class 1C Disc.; Registrant honorable separated from land or naval forces.

Class 2A: Man supporting the national health, safety, or interest.

Class 2B: Man in war production.

Class 2A (F) and

Class 2B (F): When a registrant in Class 2A or 2B has been found disqualified for military service or qualified for limited service he shall be identified by following his classification with the letter (F)

Class 2C: Man in agriculture. Class 3D: Man deferred by reason of extreme hardship and privation to wife, child or parents.

Class 4A: Registrant who has attained his 38th birthday.

Class 4B: Official deferred by law.

Class 4C: Alien.

Class 4D: Minister of religion or divinity student.

Class 4E: Conscientious objector.

Class 4F: Physically or mentally unfit.
