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# JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON by Betty Waznis



Hello, everyone, and welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today brought to you by yours truly, Betty Waznis and Chula Vista Public Library.

On Wednesday, State Attorney General Rob Bonta announced that he and several environmental groups reached a settlement with Baldwin & Sons over the Otay Ranch Village 13 project, the next phase of Baldwin and Sons' Otay Ranch master-planned community. In November 2020, the county Board of Supervisors had approved the development, but environmental activists and the state attorney general's office sued the county over claims it violated the California Environmental Quality Act. The project originally featured 1,938 homes, a resort hotel, an elementary school, a fire station, more than 3 miles of trails, 40,000 square feet of commercial space and more than 1,100 acres of nature preserves at the northeast corner of Lower Otay Lake in unincorporated San Diego County. Under the settlement, the project will reduce its building area footprint by nearly 300 acres, which will be preserved as open space. Still, the developer would be allowed to apply to the county to add 812 more dwelling units above the original 1,938 previously approved. Among other additional conditions, the agreement requires that all buildings be fully electric and have fire-suppressing sprinklers and speeds up the widening of Otay Lakes Road near Lake Crest Drive from two to four lanes.

We all know about the deadly bird flu that's killing birds and mammals around the globe. For the past three years, the San Diego Zoo, the Safari Park and Seaworld have created new and innovative strategies to protect the exotic and endangered animals in their care. So far, they have succeeded. None of the birds or animals in the collections of the zoo, Safari Park or SeaWorld have tested positive for the bird flu virus. Other zoos haven't been so lucky. Birds at Chicago's Lincoln Park Zoo and New York's Bronx Zoo and Queens Zoo have died, and an animal sanctuary in Washington reported losing 20 big cats. San Diego is on the Pacific Flyway, a north-south route taken by migrating birds between Alaska and South America. The Safari Park is a popular stop. On any given day, wild birds can be seen next to birds in the park's collection. Migrating wild birds, especially ducks and geese, are considered the parks's number one risk, so the zoo and parks are doing everything they can to keep wild birds away. During migration months they relocate some birds into netted or covered habitat spaces, drain and enclose flamingo ponds, remove nests of wild birds, place metal spikes on railings and roofs to discourage roosting, install covered trash cans and new feeding troughs too tall for ducks or gulls to get into. Plus, veterinary staff have implemented an emergency trial of an experimental bird flu vaccine for their California condors, a highly endangered species with only 560 left alive.

The Padres 2025 season opened yesterday on a clear sunny afternoon at beautiful Petco Park, facing the Atlanta Braves. And what a start! In front of a record high opening day Petco crowd, the Padres came from behind to win 7 to 4 in the first of a 4 game series.

Coming up at your Chula Vista Public library - next Thursday the Registrar of Voters will present a voter education workshop in preparation for the District 1 supervisorial election on April 8. The Civic Center Library's Heritage Museum's current exhibit "Filipinos of the South Bay" continues through December.
