CREATE HOPE in the WORLD

JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON by Betty Waznis



Hello, everyone and welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today sponsored by Risa Baron and Republic Services.

Last week, the few surviving veterans of World War II's "Ghost Army" were honored for their service during a Congressional Gold Medal ceremony on Capitol Hill. The mission of the secret "Ghost Army" unit, which numbered about 1,100 troops, was to fool and divert German troops, a mission so undercover that it was only declassified in 1996. They inflated fake rubber tanks, created fake airfields, blasted recorded sounds of marching troops through loudspeakers, created fake uniform patches, painted trucks with fake markings, and more. The ruses forced German commanders to spread their defenses thin and let the U.S. army operate with less resistance, saving the lives of an estimated 30,000 soldiers.

Just over two weeks after doctors at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston placed a genetically edited kidney from a pig inside Richard Slayman, the 62-year-old is recovering well at home and relishing "one of the happiest moments" of his life, he tells us. He had suffered from kidney failure and a failed kidney transplant and was at death's door. On March 16, he became the first living person to receive this kind of genetically edited transplant. Human and pig kidneys are of similar size. To reduce the risk of Slayman's immune system attacking the transplanted pig's organ, researchers needed to make 69 edits to the pig's genetic code. This advance could mean a bright new future for the more than 800,000 Americans suffering from kidney failure, who require dialysis to stay alive. Currently, only one out of four people waiting for a kidney transplant will get one. Medical experts hope that this advance will make dialysis obsolete.

Some noteworthy San Diego sports events this week - Larry Lucchino, who as a top executive with the San Diego Padres championed the design of Petco Park died on Tuesday at the age of 78. With its iconic view of the San Diego skyline, the newly redesigned Gallaher Square gathering place and the Western Metal Supply company façade providing a unique atmosphere, many MLB players have said that Petco is their favorite place to play, and our fans love it.

The Padres are off to a strong start, just under .500, in 3rd place in the NL West Division. Next up: they meet the Giants at their home opener in San Francisco in the first of a three-game stand. Game starts today at 1:35. Our SDSU Aztecs made it to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen, for only the 4th time. They faced off against the heavily favored, first seeded, returning national champs, University of Connecticut Huskies. The 13-seeded Aztecs kept pace with the nation's top ranked team through the first half but finally lost 52 to 82.

And finally, some hope on the horizon for the Jaguars of Southwestern College. Oscar Rodriguez has been named head football coach at Southwestern College, a program with beautiful facilities but just five wins over the last three seasons. Rodriguez has 20 years experience at the high school and college level, and was named NCAA Division III AFCA National Assistant Coach of the Year in 2017.

Our sponsor, Risa Baron, is a New York native who moved with her family to California after high school. Once she experienced January in San Diego, she never wanted to leave. 

TIJUANA HOME BUILD IS APRIL 20!



Project Mercy has changed the family for whom we will be building a home. The recent pounding storms made access to the building site in a steep hill area very difficult, especially for sedans. The Secundino family will receive their home in a few months.

Meet the Simbron Ximeo family! Jessica Ximeo (33) and Alberto Simbron (39) are from Veracruz. Alberto is a mason's assistant and earn 3000 pesos per week (\$176) when he can find work. Daughter Kenia (14) likes school, where she is doing very well. She likes to read and draw. She wants to be an architect when she grows up. The younger daughter Daniela is playful and helps her mother with housework. She wants to be a doctor when she grows up.

(From their application) In Mother Jessica's own words: One of the biggest challenges living here is the lack of running water. We have to buy it from a passing tanker truck and it is expensive and not readily available. We borrow and electrical line from a neighbor, but the electricity is weak and intermittent. Our house is not well built because we have had to use whatever material we could afford. At night, the cold wind and dust blow in and when it rains, the dirt turns into a mud flow. These living conditions aggravate the asthma of my daughters and makes them very uncomfortable.

Our economic situation is not very good. We can barely afford basic food and household needs. My daughters have big ambitions for their futures, so I tell her to study hard so that they can get a scholarship because maybe financially, we can't afford to help them. However, I hope that tomorrow their dreams will be fulfilled.

Having a decent house is very important to us more than anything, to have a warm place for my daughters. We don't have enough money to buy a jacket or thick blankets to get through the fold, and I want them to be more comfortable.

I would be very grateful if you could support us with a house. May you give us the opportunity and may God bless you always. Thank you.
