Hello, everyone and welcome to today's edition of the Jim B1iddle News at Noon. Today is sponsored by Suzanne Catanzaro. Monday was a red-letter day for sky watchers as a total eclipse rolled across North America with almost everyone on the continent able to see at least a partial eclipse. The total solar eclipse started along Mexico's Pacific coast and in just 1 hour, 40 minutes the moon's shadow raced more than 4,000 miles across 15 states, Canada and then the North Atlantic. An estimated 44 million people live within the path, with a couple hundred million more within 200 miles, making it likely the most viewed astronomical event in history. In San Diego, a lot of excitement and viewing parties even though our eclipse was a partial one. The Fleet Science Center threw a viewing party for thousands, providing eclipse glasses and telescopes for the public.

Several airlines across the country promoted flights with routes that intersected with the total eclipse path, including this one departing from San Diego. Passengers were supplied with glasses, an information guide and eclipse-decorated cookies. As one point, the plane slowed, maneuvered some S-turns, and descended to 33,000 feet, allowing passengers to view a once-in-a-lifetime event: a total solar eclipse seen from the air.

Gold has turned into money for <u>Costco</u>. They're selling 1-ounce bars made of nearly pure 24-karat gold at an estimated 2% above the spot price, estimated at \$2400. The limit is 2 bars per customer and sell out quickly, typically gone in a few hours. Expected revenue is \$100 million to \$200 million a month, thanks to aggressive pricing and a high level of customer trust, quite a move for a product that only <u>debuted last August</u> and generated about \$100 million in sales in its first quarter.

The NCAA final men's tournament concluded this past week. UConn proved too much for the Purdue Boilermakers, as the Huskies won 75-60, giving the winners back-to-back titles, and their sixth crown in men's basketball. And the women of the other USC (The University of South Carolina) completed their perfect season with an 87-75 NCAA victory over national scoring champion Caitlin Clark and the Iowa Hawkeyes. The Gamecocks with a 38-0 record became only the 10th Division I team to go an entire season without a loss.

The Padres <u>celebrated the 20th anniversary of Petco Park</u> Monday by overcoming an 8-0 deficit to defeat the Chicago Cubs, 9-8, on an eighth-inning, two-run homer by Fernando Tatis. They wrapped up their first winning series of the season Wednesday with a 10-2 victory over the Cubs. Next up - Dodgers in LA, tonight at 7:10.

Today's sponsor is Suzanne Catanzaro. Born in Buffalo, married her college sweetheart, moved to San Francisco where she worked for the Reading Development Center. She and husband Paul and their two school age children spent nearly 4 years living and cruising on their 45' sailboat,

In 1983, they moved to Bonita where Suzanne started one of the first computer-based tutorial companies. Three years later, she founded a private high school and later added elementary grades. She became very interested in the learning disability, dyslexia. Being dyslexic herself, she understood the strange characteristics of this disability. This led her to develop a unique sequence of reading exercises for dyslexic students. Bonita Country Day School became recognized for its students' academic accomplishments, with whole kindergarten and first grade classes ranked at the top one percentile in the nation. The school closed in 2020 with the onset of COVID. Suzanne gifted the entire facility to the adjacent church. Now retired, she's a community volunteer, a full-time artist, is still an avid sailor, and crews in weekly sailboat races. At nearly 80, she thinks that she's the oldest sailor in the fleet!
