Good afternoon, Rotarians, visiting Rotarians, and guests. Today's Jim Biddle News at Noon is sponsored by The Shields Family.

Starting the news this week where I ended it last week... 'Twisters' whipped up big crowds and big dollars at box office. Moviegoers ran toward the tornadoes over the weekend, propelling "Twisters" to a blockbuster opening. The standalone sequel to the 1996 hit made \$80.5 million in ticket sales from more than 4100 theaters in North America. That is about \$30 million more than analysts expected initially and makes for the biggest opening of a live-action movie yet this summer.

Look out golf...Pickleball is coming for your corporate schmoozers. While golf courses long have been hailed as the premier venue for closing deals and wooing clients, a growing number are finding that pickleball saves them time and money, while being more inclusive and easier to play. Corporate bookings at pickleball clubs across the U.S. spiked in June from the previous month. Individual pickleball club operators back this up, saying that company events are increasing exponentially. Ace Pickleball Club, with locations in various states, has had a steady flow of corporate gatherings, with event requests at new locations piling up even before they open. Pickleballerz club in Chantilly, Va., reports corporate bookings have roughly tripled since 2021. The court is becoming especially popular among lawyers, bankers and realtors looking to expand their professional circles. In Rochester Hills, Mich., pickleball instructor Robert Dunn said he sees lawyers with clients, business types talking shop and auto industry executives bringing suppliers and purchasers to play. "Even if the intent isn't business, business is often a topic of conversation," Dunn said.

Firefighters in the West are scrambling as new wildfires threaten communities in Oregon, California and Washington, with at least one Oregon fire so large that it is creating its own weather. Interstate 84 in eastern Oregon was closed in both directions Tuesday between Ontario and Baker City as flames from the Durkee fire advanced toward the road in multiple locations. On Tuesday, the Oregon Department of Transportation also closed the eastbound lanes of I-84 from Pendleton to Baker City. Near the California-Nevada border, a series of lightning-sparked wildfires was threatening structures Tuesday in several communities southwest of Portola.B
