

# JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON by Betty Waznis



Hello, everyone. Welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today's News brought to you by Lori Torio and the Living Coast Discovery Center.

Two months after opening its first bridge shelter, Chula Vista is on the way to transforming a motel into housing and safe parking for the homeless, using state and federal funds. On Tuesday the Chula Vista City Council approved the purchase of the 77-year-old Palomar Motel. It sits on a parcel just over an acre on Walnut Avenue, just east of Interstate 5 near Palomar Street and Industrial Boulevard. It will cost about \$7 million to purchase the motel and \$6 million to convert it into 31 long-term housing units, each with a full bathroom and kitchenette, along with space for management, onsite services, and a safe parking lot. It's expected to open sometime in 2025.

An algae bloom off the California coast is creating a neurotoxin called domoic acid that has sickened and killed hundreds of sea lions and dolphins. With algae blooms like this one, the domoic acid is transferred to fish, which are then eaten by sea lions and other marine life. As the toxins work their way through the food web, they can cause aberrations in behavior, sickness, and death. It's led to a surge of sick and potentially aggressive sea lions washing ashore. Sea lions sickened by the algae bit and injured at least two people recently at beaches in Orange County, and 5 more in Santa Barbara and Ventura counties. SeaWorld San Diego has reported an uptick of rescue calls here in San Diego, where sea lions charged beachgoers at La Jolla Cove just this past Sunday. Marine mammals aren't the only ones affected. Because the neurotoxin can reach fish that are eaten as part of the food chain, seabirds also can be infected. In fact, some in the scientific community believe Alfred Hitchcock's 1963 horror film "The Birds" was inspired by a 1961 incident in which birds in central California were exposed to domoic acid during an algae bloom and became disoriented and aggressive.

The national weather continues to make news. Manatee Bay, in the Florida Keys, has reported a preliminary water temperature reading of 101.1 degrees – possibly the hottest ocean temperature ever recorded, just about the temperature of your backyard hot tub. The heat dome over Phoenix and Las Vegas continues to produce unprecedented strings of record-breaking heat, Phoenix hitting a record high of 119 on Tuesday, for the third time this year.

Coastal Californians haven't had it too bad, and in any case, we have a safety valve not too far away. Mammoth Mountain, still benefiting from its historic 700 inches of snowfall this season, plans to remain open until Aug. 6. Only twice in the resort's 69-year history had this happened.

The United States managed a 1-1 draw with the Netherlands at the Women's World Cup soccer tournament on Wednesday night. With the draw, neither team secured a spot in the knockout round yet, with one group match remaining. Both the Americans and the Dutch top the Group E standings with a win and a draw, but the U.S. has the edge for the lead with more goals. USA plays Portugal in its group finale at midnight local time Monday in Australia.






Eric Rimmele brought his mother and brother, visiting for 3 weeks from Cologne, Germany. They flew home the very next day.
