Otay Valley Regional Park (OVRP) is a multi-jurisdictional planning effort by the County and the cities of San Diego and Chula Vista.

The long-term vision for this park is for it to connect recreational park and trail land from the salt ponds at San Diego Bay to the land surrounding the Otay Lakes Reservoir. From playing fields and picnic areas to hiking, biking and horse trails, the park will provide visitors with a variety of recreation opportunities.

Development will be balanced by efforts to protect and preserve native habitats, local wildlife and cultural resources.

Camille Wildburger, the Park Project Manager, will provide a project overview, share updates and insights, provide ways to help share this news, and access to public participation surveys. This will serve as an opportunity for South Bay residents, community members, and stakeholders to contribute ideas, provide feedback, and stay informed about the project's developments.

- Too much swimming to note everything but think about this...decorated Olympian Mark Spitz won eight gold medals in a speedo, mustache, and no goggles. Swimmers today have the advantage of technology in training and aerodynamic suits. Amazing that often, the difference between a gold medal and a bronze medal is less than 5/100 of a second about the time it takes a human to blink!
- Men's team gymnastics won bronze the first men's team medal in gymnastics in 16 years for the U.S.
- Women's team gymnastics gold...redemption tour...US won three of the last four Olympics team golds, narrowly losing in Tokyo to the Russian Olympic Committee. Simone Biles is now the most decorated gymnast ever; and could become the most decorated female Olympian by the end of the Paris Olympics.
