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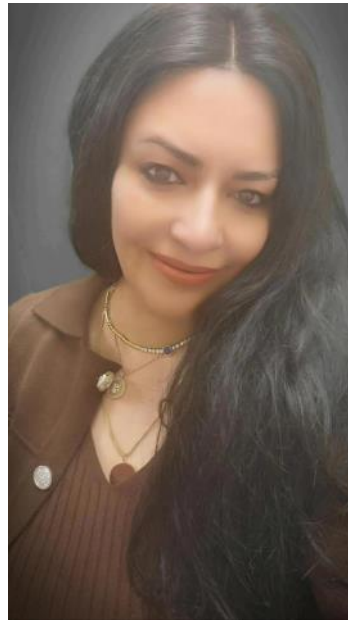

Hello, everyone, and welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today brought to you by Soraya Martinez and Banner Bank. *(Read by David Hoffman)*

A proposed mixed-use development called *Pangaea* would bring new sports facilities for adults and youth to the Chula Vista Bayfront, including tennis courts, a water polo academy, and space for future community soccer fields. The project, currently under review by the Port of San Diego, is planned for 124 acres at 990 Bay Blvd., within the Chula Vista Bayfront Master Plan area, former home of the South Bay Power Plant.

The first phase of the proposed development includes a tennis center with 34 courts, a central match venue, and a sports therapy facility. A water polo academy, co-founded by Olympic athletes Tony Azevedo and Maggie Steffens, would relocate its training programs to the complex. The second phase includes a 50,000-seat stadium and 9.3 acres of open space that may be used for community soccer fields. In addition to the sports facilities, the plan includes 300,000 square feet of retail, multiple hotels, office and lab buildings dedicated to blue tech and aquaculture industries, public trails, a mini-golf venue co-owned by Tiger Woods, and an IMAX theater.

Responding to a lot of resident concerned about safety, the Chula Vista city council took action last week to address the danger posed by young kids on e-bikes. Without a single speaker in opposition, the Council voted unanimously to adopt the strictest e-bike regulations in San Diego County. The new rules, set to take effect next month, ban children under age 12 from riding e-bikes, require riders under age 18 to wear helmets, forbid riders under 18 from carrying passengers, and require all riders to obey traffic laws and stay off sidewalks in business districts and other designated areas.

Research compiled by city staff showed that e-bike injuries are on the rise and are more severe than regular bicycle injuries. In just the past 12 months, 16 people in Chula Vista were injured in e-bike accidents, 12 of them requiring emergency room care. The city will partner with local school districts to inform students and parents about the new regulations. For the law's first 60 days, police will issue warnings. Starting in late October, police can issue \$25 tickets, which riders can waive by completing an online safety course. Repeat violators will be subject to increasing fines up to \$250 and could have their bikes confiscated by police.

Comic Con is back! Starting yesterday, 135,000 fans and industry professionals began to converge for four days of entertainment, creativity, and sneak peeks at upcoming movie and TV releases. ComicCon started in **San Diego in 1970**, as a one-day comic book convention with about 100 attendees. Since then, it has been held **every year** in San Diego—making 2025 its **56th consecutive year**. Over time, it's evolved into the world's largest pop-culture convention celebrating comics, movies, TV, games, and fandom, with the over-the-top costume show we've come to expect inside and outside the Convention Center.

If you're looking for entertainment on a less stressful scale, our local major league soccer team, San Diego Football Club, kicks off two weeks of home games at Snapdragon Stadium. San Diego FC is currently ranked first in both the MLS Western Conference and in the overall MLS standings based on their performance in the current season - very impressive for an expansion team in their first season - they didn't start playing until February. SDFC has been putting on quite a show for fans. Goals are the most exciting part of soccer games, and SDFC has scored more than any other team in the MLS, with a fast-paced, high-pressure style of play. The game day atmosphere is lively with drinks, food, music, drums and chanting fans with lucha libre flair. SDFC also hosts a family-friendly pregame fan fest. Their next game is tonight at Snapdragon Stadium against Nashville at 7:30pm. Tickets start at about \$20.
