Looking for a way to serve as Rotarians once they moved to Mexico, Gabe and Lucille founded the Rotary Club of Rosarito La Misión in 2016. He will address the challenges and joys faced by ex-pats in starting and running a club in Mexico. Among the unique challenges are dealing with government officials who change every two years and the fascinating process of getting a Mexican bank account.

Hello, everyone. Welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon, today sponsored by Reed and Beta Dinsmore.

The Petra Development Group of investors, hoping to own a Major League Soccer franchise, is pursuing a long-shot venture to build the nation's largest soccer-specific stadium with up to 50,000 seats and two attached hotels on a 136-acre portion of the Chula Vista Bayfront formerly occupied by the South Bay Power Plant. Recently the group spoke publicly about its intent to privately finance a \$2.5-billion sports and entertainment complex, with the MLS stadium and hotels complemented by an athletic training center, shops and restaurants, an e-sports venue, practice fields for youth leagues and specialized office buildings. The project, which was presented to Chula Vista City Council in a redacted fashion in August, has garnered the support of city officials, including Chula Vista Mayor John McCann

The Port of San Diego has permitting authority, subject to review and approval by the California Coastal Commission. The agency's board has yet to consider the proposition. Major League Soccer, the nation's top tier men's league, has telegraphed an intent to select its 30th franchise this year and has stated that San Diego is a top contender for the expansion.

Nearly 43,000 people died in U.S. traffic crashes in 2021, the highest number in 16 years. The 2021 final numbers, released last week by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, showed an 11 percent increase in deaths over 2020. That's the highest number since 2005 and the largest percentage increase since 1975.

Data shows a 12 percent rise in fatal crashes involving at least one distracted driver. Also up were other categories of deaths including pedestrians, cyclists, unbelted passengers, drunk drivers, crashes involving trucks weighing more than 10,000 pounds, and speeding related deaths. At a recent news conference, NHTSA focused on distracted driving fatalities, which they said are entirely preventable if drivers stop using their cellphones, eating, or doing anything that diverts attention from the road.

A \$250,000 grant from Republic Services's 2023 National Neighborhood Promise program will help clean up the Otay Valley Regional Park, one of South County's largest open-space areas. Urban Corps of San Diego County, a job-training program and charter school with a focus on community service, will carry out the project starting next month. It expects to remove about 600 tires, 2,000 pounds of electronic and hazardous waste and about 500,000 square feet of brush and non-native plant species. The Otay Valley Regional Park has been a work in progress for more than three decades. It makes up most of Chula Vista's south greenbelt and encompasses about 900 acres, linking South County to lower Otay Lake Reservoir through the Otay River. In 1990, San Diego County and the cities of Chula Vista and San Diego signed a joint-powers agreement to tackle years of illegally dumped trash, mattresses, tires, industrial debris, and stormwater runoff that was polluting the river. Today, the park offers 8.3 miles of multiuse trails, seven ponds, birdwatching opportunities and several recreational areas.

Beta and Reed met in Iceland in 1969, and it was love at first sight. Beta was born and raised in Reykjavik, and Reed was stationed there in the Air Force. They married in 1970 and lived in So. California until 1984 where they raised their 2 children. When Reed ended his law enforcement career, they moved to Oregon so he could attend law school. Reed worked as a Deputy District Attorney, and Beta serviced SBA loans and prepared taxes until they retired in 2013. Now they mix travel and watching five grandchildren grow, and have lived in Michigan, Maine, and Vermont as well as California. They enjoy being members of Rotary and the volunteer opportunities it gives.

Tiffany Allen brought us up to date on numerous plans and projects underway on the CV Bayfront.



President-elect Mora de Murguia sent her letter via email to all members on April 2—please be sure to respond by April 28. It is vital to planning for our upcoming Rotary year.


