Hello, everyone. Welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon, today sponsored by David Hoffman and Hoffman Hanono Insurance.

A new tourism opportunity between Baja CA and San Diego may be in the works. Baja California's Secretary of Economy Kurt Honold Morales announced plans for a June trial run of a ferry from Ensenada to San Diego. The boat would dock at the Embarcadero and could carry about 300 people. The trip would be a touristic option, not a commuter option, with an expected duration of 2 to 3 hours and a projected cost of \$28. There are also tentative plans for a ferry stop in Rosarito.

Netflix has announced the end of its DVD-by-mail rental service, ending an era that began in 1997. The DVD service will mail its final discs on Sept. 29, having shipped more than 5 billion discs across the U.S over the past quarter century. Remnants of ancient viruses passed down over thousands or even millions of years and still in our DNA may help fight cancer, according to a recent study. Ancient viral DNA which forms about 5% of the human genome is passed down from the historic infections of our ancestors. The discovery was made by scientists at England's Francis Crick Institute who were studying lung cancer, trying to understand why some patients respond better than others to immunotherapy.

Through their research, published in the journal Nature this week, they found the dormant relics of certain of these virus cells can be activated by cancer cells to produce antibodies that then attack the cancer tumor. It's hoped that the link between viruses and the antibodies they can produce could lead to a vaccine for cancer.

If you've been to the beach this week, you might be asking, "what are those blue blobs on the sand? In a spectacle rarely seen along the San Diego County coastline, thousands of little critters called Velella velellas — or "by-the-wind sailors" — are washing ashore in a mass stranding with sightings from Ocean Beach to Carlsbad. Scientists say it is a natural phenomenon that typically occurs when there is a combination of onshore winds and plenty of food in the water. The creatures — which are about the size of a human thumb —consist of a blue disc with a sail-like vertical crest rising from the middle, and tentacles whose sting is benign to humans.

Yesterday was the day Padres fans have been waiting for. Fernando Tatis Jr is back after serving an 80-game suspension for use of performance enhancing drugs. He started in the first of a four game away series against the Diamondbacks, playing right field. Padres won 7 to 5. It was estimated that Zonies-in-reverse San Diegans outnumbered Phoenix fans in the Chase Field stands to welcome Tatis back.




