Good afternoon Rotarians and guests. Welcome to the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today's news sponsored by David Hoffman and Hoffman Hanono Insurance.

More than 4 million people, nearly 10 percent of the population, have fled Ukraine in the last five weeks. It's the fastest-growing refugee crisis in Europe since World War II. The conflict has forced 1 in 4 Ukrainians, including half the nation's children, out of their homes, seeking refuge within the country or across its borders.

The White House announced yesterday that the nation's Strategic Petroleum Reserve will release 1 million barrels of oil a day to offset the loss of Russian crude oil from world markets, starve Russia of revenue, and lower gas prices. The release is the biggest withdrawal in the reserve's more than 46-year history and will continue for the next six months. The first barrels will hit the market in May.

Federal regulators authorized second booster shots of the Pfizer and Moderna coronavirus vaccines Tuesday for everyone 50 and older, to bolster fading immunity against severe disease in case the virus sweeps the nation again in the coming months. The FDA said this age group could get the additional shot at least four months after their first booster. The agency authorized a second booster for people 12 and older with certain immune deficiencies.

A NASA astronaut caught a Russian ride back to Earth on Wednesday after a U.S. record 355 days at the International Space Station. Mark Vande Hei landed in a Soyuz capsule in Kazakhstan on Wednesday, returning with two Russian cosmonauts. Despite escalating tensions between the U.S. and Russia, Vande Hei's return followed customary amicable procedures. A small NASA team was on hand for the parachute touchdown and planned to return immediately to Houston with the 55-year-old astronaut. Vande Hei underwent medical testing during his long space voyage to further NASA's quest to get astronauts back to the moon and on to Mars.

For the first time this season, some of the cold, hard cash in the billion-dollar world of college sports is hitting the wallets of the players themselves by legitimate means. Tomorrow Kansas, Villanova, North Carolina and Duke will play in the first NCAA mens basketball Final Four to be held under the new world of "name, image and likeness" endorsements in college sports. The new rules permit college athletes to profit from endorsements within certain guidelines. Experts estimate that by the time next year's Final Four rolls around, every men's basketball and football player on a major Division I roster could be making \$100,000 or more.

MEET THE RAMIREZ TAFOLLA FAMILY— TIJUANA HOME BUILD IS SATURDAY, APRIL 23

Meet the Ramirez Tafolla family that will receive the home we will build in collaboration with Project Mercy!

The mother, Concepcion, is 57, and was born in Sinaloa. She and her husband migrated to Tijuana 40 years ago in search of work. Unfortunately, her husband of 35 years died 8 years ago and she was left to raise 8 children—and now her grandchildren.

Grandson Dilan is 14, very attentive and likes to help others. He wants to be a doctor.

Yamilet, 9, is caring and loving, however she has significant learning disabilities. Because the family does not have money, they have not been able to provide therapy. Two months ago, she developed strange bruises and spots on her skin and mouth. It was diagnosed as an allergy but the medicine is expensive (2500+ pesos) and they cannot afford it.

Conception receives a small pension of 2000 pesos (@\$103) Her daughter Alexandra (20) sells donuts in the streets and earns 150 pesos per week (\$8).

In Concepcion's own words: We do not have running water so we have to buy water from a passing tanker truck but it is expensive. When it rains, water leaks through holes in the roof and turns the floor to mud and get our clothes and bed wet.

I am very happy to know that you can help us by building a house since it is very difficult for us to do so on our own. We dream of a place where we will not be cold; a place where my children and grandchildren will be safe and warm.
