Reed enjoys reading and golf, of dubious quality, and traveling. I enjoy the time we get to spend with our children and grandchildren.

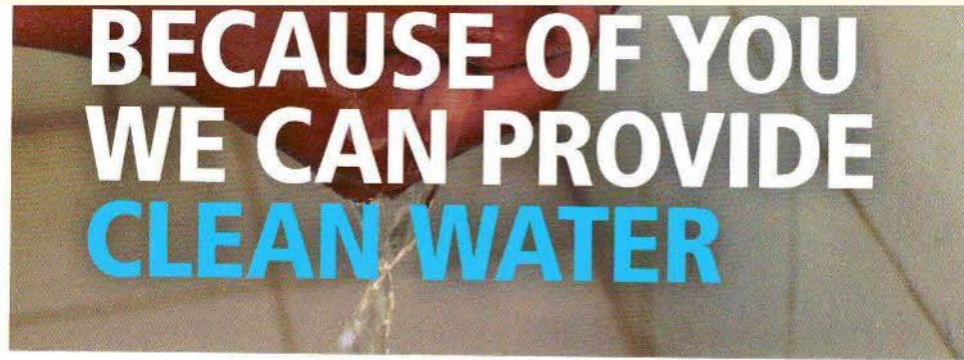
