> The Honorable Mary Casillas Salas Mayor of the City of Chula Vista Friday, August 13, 2021—Noon



This Friday, we welcome the Mayor of Chula Vista, Mary Casillas Salas. We will hear up to date information about our city and region.

Mayor Mary Casillas Salas was elected to the City Council in 1996 and re-elected in 2000. In 2004, she served as the first Latina Sweetwater Authority Director. In 2006, she was elected to the California State Assembly and served until 2010. She returned to the City Council in 2012 and in 2014, she made history as the first elected Latina mayor in the County of San Diego.

She led two half-cent sales tax measures, Measure P in 2016 to rebuild aging infrastructure, and Measure A in 2018 to hire more police and fire personnel. She has advanced the development of the Chula Vista Bayfront, a 1600-room resort hotel and 275,000 square foot convention center.

Mayor Salas continues to work to bring a four-year university and the revitalization of western Chula Vista. She has two daughters Michele and Sara and is grandmother to Michael, Adriana, and Marissa. Mary graduated with honors from San Diego State University

JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON



Good afternoon, Rotarians, and guests. Welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon, today sponsored by Dr Kathi Mits and Tanaka Dental Corporation.

A 3-week-old wildfire engulfed the tiny Northern California mountain town of Greenville on Wednesday. A church, hotel, museum, and bar were among the gold rush era structures that burned down. More than 100 homes were destroyed as well.

Another evacuation warning was issued yesterday as flames pushed toward two other nearby mountain communities, Taylorsville, and Chester. Although progress was made earlier this week, high heat, low humidity, and gusty winds are expected to remain a threat. Firefighters say that trees, grass and brush are so dry that if an ember lands, it's virtually guaranteed to start a new fire.

Southwestern College students, faculty and staff must be vaccinated against COVID-19 before returning to campus for the fall semester on August 23. The policy relies on individuals attesting that they have been fully immunized. Students and employees who are partly vaccinated will have to provide proof of their next vaccine appointment.

Face coverings will also be mandatory in indoor spaces for everyone. Unvaccinated people without medical or religious exemptions will be asked to continue virtual learning. San Ysidro Health will be offering vaccination clinics on campus during the first two weeks of the fall semester.

Big league pro football debuted in San Diego 60 years ago today. The San Diego Chargers of the American Football League defeated the Houston Oilers 27-14 on a 93-degree afternoon in the first preseason game in Balboa Stadium on August 6, 1961. Jack Kemp was quarterback, coming off a season ranked as the AFL's premium passer.

Dr. Kathi Tanaka Mits is a 29-year Chula Vista Rotary member and a USC graduate. She follows in the footsteps of her father, longtime Chula Vista Rotarian and dentist Dr. Terry Tanaka with whom she shares a dental practice here in Chula Vista.

August is a special month for Dr Kathi. Her parent's wedding anniversary and her own wedding anniversary are this month. This August is the 30th anniversary of her beginning work as a dentist. And this month her son Michael starts his second year at SDSU and daughter Kristin starts her senior year at Bonita Vista High School.
