

JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON



Good afternoon, Rotarians and guests. Today's Jim Biddle News at Noon is brought to you by Diane Flint Wages.

In COVID news this week: the State of California now requires all teachers and staff in public and private California schools to be vaccinated or be tested weekly. San Diego school leaders say this will not directly affect most county educators, since the vast majority are already vaccinated.

Hawaii Governor David Ige announced yesterday that two visitors from the US mainland were arrested by state authorities for allegedly trying to pass off fake proof of vaccinations. The arrests were made following a tip from a community member.

After igniting a month ago, the Dixie fire in northern California has now burned more than half a million acres. Last night's thunderstorms, with wind gusts up to 45 mph and reports of spotty lightning added to already treacherous conditions. The fire has crossed containment lines in some areas and grounded water-dropping helicopters. Smoke from the fire as seen in this aerial photo is drifting more than 1000 miles away.

San Diego was well represented with champions in the Tokyo Olympics. Team USA topped China 39-38 in the gold medal table with an unexpected win in one of the final events from Jennifer Valente, who learned to ride at the San Diego Velodrome to become the first U.S. women to claim gold in track cycling. She was part of a U.S. gold-medal haul that included four others with San Diego ties: Scripps Ranch High and SDSU alum Xander Schauffele (men's golf), former La Jolla Country Day star Kelsey Plum (3x3 women's basketball), Encinitas resident Michael Andrew (men's swimming) and SDSU incoming freshman Nevin Harrison (women's canoe).


Diane Flint Wages joined Chula Vista Rotary in 1989 when she became Vice President/Manager of Bank of America's Chula Vista Main Office on Third Ave and E St. That bank had a long history in Chula Vista dating back to the 1920's when it was known as Bank of Italy. Managers before her, probably dating to the founding of our club, were members of Chula Vista Rotary. She was the first woman to manage the bank, became one of the early women members of our club, and was installed as the first woman President of the Club in 1998-99, thanks to Jim Biddle who was Diane's sponsor. We were proud to honor her as Rotarian of the Year for 2017-18.

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THOUGHTS FOR TODAY



We recently lost a very dedicated and active Rotarian, David Ballesteros. He was a remarkable human being who dedicated his life to helping people around the world.

As a dean at SDSU, he assisted countless students in becoming future leaders in San Diego and Imperial County communities. As a Rotarian for over 37 years, David held numerous leadership positions within the Calexico Rotary Club and later the La Mesa Sunrise Rotary Club, where he led numerous district and global grant partnerships that delivered vital programs in Ecuador, Mexico, and Honduras.

He served as Assistant Governor for District 5340 and encouraged us to look beyond our own clubs. He worked to strengthen our bond with Mexico (Rotary District 4100- Baja California, Baja California Sur, Sonora, Norte de Sinaloa) through friendship and service to others.

David had long envisioned a future where technology would make it possible to create a truly global Rotary club where members from around the world could meet virtually and work together to effect positive change on a global scale. This vision came to fruition in 2016 when he helped found the Rotary E-club of San Diego Global. 5 years later, the Rotary E-club of San Diego Global continues to thrive with members in six countries and three Global Grants completed.

David touched many of our lives and will always be remembered. Truly a life well-lived.

A memorial service will be held on Sunday, August 22nd at 11:30 AM at Funeraria del Angel at 753 Broadway, Chula Vista.
