Hello, everyone. Welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon, today sponsored by Glen Googins. Navy divers began pulling pieces of the downed Chinese spy balloon from the ocean floor on Tuesday, using sophisticated reconnaissance drones dubbed the Kingfish and the Swordfish to locate the debris. The balloon, shot down Saturday by a US fighter jet, was about 200 feet tall and carrying equipment roughly the size of a regional jet liner, and estimated to weigh one ton.

After collecting all of the balloon's white fabric and shell structure floating on the surface, the Navy has now shifted to an underwater search for the remnants of the massive balloon. Navy and Coast Guard personnel are using underwater drones to locate and map the debris field, and divers are in the water gathering up what they can. The balloon debris is scattered in waters that are about 50 feet deep, but stretch across an area 15 football fields long and 15 football fields wide.

As movie theaters have attempted to recover from the pandemic, exhibitors have increasingly looked at more variable pricing methods, especially for large-format screens, 3D showings, and high-demand movies during their first week of release. AMC Theaters, the nation's largest movie theater chain, on Monday unveiled a new pricing scheme in which seat location determines how much your movie ticket costs. AMC said the pricing plan, dubbed "Sightline," has already been rolled out in some locations and, by the end of the year, will be in place at all domestic AMC theaters during showings after 4 p.m. Seats classified as "standard sightline" will be at a premium price, with the "value sightline" seats on the side or the front row selling for less.

With a stepback jump shot with 10.9 seconds left in the third quarter of the Los Angeles Lakers' game against the Oklahoma City Thunder on Tuesday night, LeBron James pushed his career total to 38,388 points and broke the NBA career scoring record that Kareem Abdul-Jabbar held for nearly four decades.

The game stopped while James celebrated with outstretched arms, Abdul-Jabbar rose from his seat and clapped, and James' mother, wife and children took the floor for a ceremony recognizing the moment. Abdul-Jabbar held the scoring ball up, then handed it to James, in a ceremonial passing of the torch, as James wiped away tears from his eyes.

Today's sponsor, Glen Googins, is our esteemed city attorney, now retired. He's been a member of Chula Vista Rotary for 19 years, - in fact, he was pretty young when he joined up. He's a 20 year employee of the City of Chula Vista and two time winner of the elected office of City Attorney. We've enjoyed his quick wit and humor through many Rotary celebrations, especially Valentines Day – here are two happy winners of a past friendly competition.


