JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON



Hello, everyone. Good to see you today. Welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon, sponsored by Dr Rasha Roshdy and AMNA Sanctuary.

Waterlogged San Diego County got hit yesterday by a bomb cyclone storm, closing the Ocean Beach Pier, threatening mudslides on coastal bluffs, 35 mile per hour onshore winds and 12 to 20 foot waves. The storm unleashed even stronger winds and heavier rain across Northern California on Wednesday, triggering evacuations and power outages This storm is the third atmospheric river that's hit California in the last two weeks, prompting Governor Newsom to declare a state of emergency. The weather service says California could get four more of these subtropical "Pineapple Express" storms by Jan. 17 or 18. The storms do help the county's seasonal precipitation. Since the rainy season began Oct. 1, Lindbergh Field has recorded 4.12 inches of rain, nearly an inch above average.

California's largest reservoirs remain very low after the state's driest three years on record, but a major source of reservoir water, the Sierra Nevada snowpack, is measuring 174 percent of average for this time of year. If the rest of the rainy season turns out to be very wet, experts say there is a chance that California's reservoirs could refill in the summer.

Passengers on a Monday excursion with Capt. Dave's Dolphin and Whale Watching out of Dana Point were thrilled to see a once-in-a-blue-moon sight when a gray whale gave birth to a calf right beside their boat. First, they saw the gray whale acting strangely, swimming in circles. Then the wrinkly newborn appeared. The pair swam around by the boat for about 45 minutes. Capt. Dave's crew said it was the only live viewing of a whale birth in the 25 years they've been in business.

The Mega Millions jackpot increased to an estimated \$940 million, after another drawing Tuesday resulted in plenty of losers but not a single grand prize winner. The next drawing is scheduled to be held tonight. The jackpot is the sixth largest in US history and largest since someone in California won a record \$2.04 billion Powerball prize on November 8. Just remember - Bob Bliss can't win everything.

For those who might care: the Chargers beat the Rams 31-10 on Sunday at SoFi Stadium to improve to 10-6 and, coupled with Baltimore's loss to Pittsburgh, move into the No. 5 playoff seed in the AFC. They can clinch the conference's top wild card with a victory in their regular-season finale at Denver on Sunday.


4th Grade: February 215th Grade: February 23
