Good afternoon, Rotarians and guests. Welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today's News sponsored by Cheryl Shields and Chick-fil-A.

Striking trash haulers voted Monday to accept Republic Services' latest contract offer, ending a monthlong walkout that saw dumpsters overflowing with uncollected garbage across Chula Vista and parts of San Diego. The vote came after increasing pressure from local government officials — including threats of fines and contract terminations. Last week, the Chula Vista City Council declared a local emergency as city workers were deployed to pick up more than 50 tons of garbage. City crews are expected to continue their cleanup efforts through the end of this week.

Hospital COVID cases remain high this week throughout our county, but there are some signs that the picture may be improving. Staffing shortages appear to be easing and the county's chief medical officer Dr Eric McDonald stated that he thinks the local Omicron spike may have turned the corner.

In other COVID news, on Wednesday, the US government announced that it would distribute 400 million nonsurgical N95 masks free of charge at community health centers and retail pharmacies across the United States, starting next week, With a limit of three masks per person. The news came a day after the administration rolled out covidtests.gov, its new website where Americans can order at-home coronavirus tests at no cost.

Forty-five colleges and universities in California will be part of a new public service program that will subsidize tuition for students who do community service alongside their studies. The program, called "Californians for All College Corps," takes its inspiration from national service programs that have helped pay for education, like AmeriCorps and the GI bill. It will start in the fall 2022 semester with 6,500 students who will be deployed to part-time work in needed areas like K-12 education and health care. In exchange for 450 hours of service, each student will receive \$10,000 toward their education and can get academic credit for their work. Seven UC campuses, 16 CSU campuses and more than two dozen community and private colleges will be part of the College Corps first year roll-out.

Rob & Cheryl love to travel and have been all over the world with their kids. They are also very involved at Skyline Church where they are launching a new ministry for Young Marrieds.
