

Good afternoon Rotarians and guests. Welcome to the Juneteenth online edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. And the State of the Club program presented by our own President Bob.

For the first time since it began lifting stay-at-home restrictions earlier this month, San Diego County has hit one of three COVID-19 triggers that indicates a pause in future re-openings. County officials announced yesterday that eight community outbreaks had occurred in the seven-day period from June 11 through Wednesday.

On the state level, Governor Newsom is now requiring masks for all Californians when in public places. This is the same order already in place for San Diego County. Travel restrictions at the U.S-Mexico border will remain through July 21. This is the third time that border restrictions have extended for an additional month since the initial joint agreement back in March in an effort to stop the spread of the coronavirus. Northbound crossings remain open for U.S. citizens, legal permanent residents, people with work visas, and those traveling for education or medical reasons and other essential purposes. Crossings remain closed for recreational and tourist travel. Travel restrictions also were extended at the U.S-Canada border. The San Ysidro Chamber of Commerce expressed its disappointment at the decision. It estimates that San Ysidro is losing more than \$1.8 million every day under the border restrictions.

In a move to help restaurants hit hard by COVID-19, the Gaslamp Quarter plans to close a four-block stretch of Fifth Avenue from Thursday to Saturday, 3 pm to midnight, essentially converting the heavily trafficked street to patio dining. The planned closure follows a similar weekend experiment by Little Italy last week. A special exemption granted by the state department of Alcoholic and Beverage Control permits liquor to be served within the patio areas in the street right-of-way.

The closure of streets via the existing special-event permit process is part of a wider initiative that would expand opportunities for more outdoor dining and shopping. The idea is to temporarily use streets, sidewalks, and private parking lots to meet social distancing requirements and increase outdoor gathering places considered to be safer. Other neighborhood associations seeking such permits to close down streets are the East Village and Downtown Business Improvement Districts, the La Jolla Shores Association, and the North Park Main Street Association

In what could be a final effort to launch a 2020 major league season, MLB team owners Wednesday presented their first proposal that includes full prorated salaries for players. The MLB proposal called for 60 games, plus a 16-team playoff field, with a season starting July 19 or 20. The players' union countered yesterday with a proposal for a 70-game season. The two sides still must reach agreement on a health and safety protocol. If successful, the negotiation could get a long-delayed season off the ground, with players reporting to a second spring training as soon as next week.

Florida Derby winner Tiz the Law is the heavy favorite to win the Belmont Stakes tomorrow. Instead of concluding the Triple Crown, the Belmont is kicking off the series which will run without spectators or owners at Belmont Park in New York.

The California State CIF Academic Team Champions is an award that celebrates the top 16 high school teams in the state with the highest collective grade point averages. Number one team with the highest collective GPA of 3.90 – Eastlake Girls soccer team. Go Titans!

June gloom continues with morning clouds clearing in midday. A perfect opportunity to enjoy the opening of the San Diego Zoo tomorrow and see 2- month old baby pygmy hippo, Akobi, who is just now coming out into the public areas for us all to admire.


Meeting Highlights of June 19, 2020 (Continued)

He re-capped our Club's extensive work throughout the year with highlights in a very fast and fun video.












