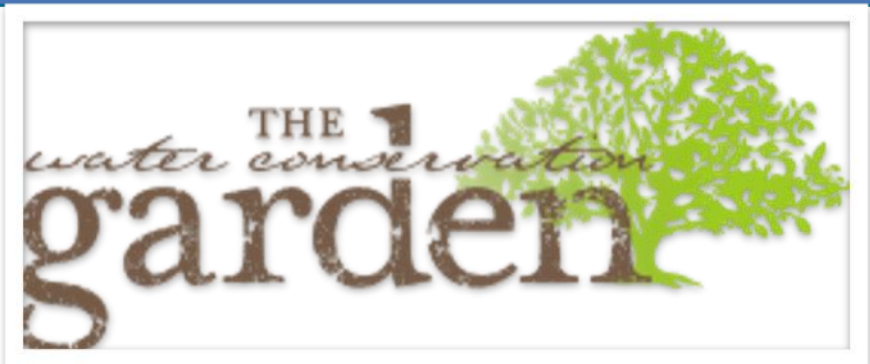

Good afternoon Rotarians and guests, and good afternoon to our speakers, Ted Lohman and Jessica Jones from Brookfield Properties. Today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon is sponsored by Dr. Ramon Moncada.

About 307,000 San Diegans who have received a COVID-19 vaccine still need a second dose. And while the CDC recommends getting your second shot within six weeks of the first, that won't happen for some residents due to a severe shortage of vaccine from Moderna.

CDC guidelines posted online last month have offered some reassuring guidance.

If the second dose is administered beyond these intervals, there is no need to re-start the series. Plus, waiting longer for your next dose might even be helpful, since other multidose vaccines, such as measles, tetanus and hepatitis A, often space out shots by two to six months — sometimes longer.

The curtain has finally fallen on San Diego/ Jack Murphy/Qualcomm Stadium as its last above-ground section was recently leveled. It's the end of an era, but a new one begins shortly. The new Aztec Stadium, with 80 acres of parks and open space, is planned for a Fall 2022 debut in time for the Aztecs Football home opener.

In other Aztec news, nineteenth-ranked Aztec basketball 71-62 victory over UNLV Wednesday clinched a second straight Mountain West regular-season title. Up next: the Mountain West Tournament quarter-final, this Thursday, at noon.

Major League Baseball Spring training exhibition games started Sunday in Arizona and Florida. The Padres kicked off the exhibition season with an 8 to 5 loss to the Brewers on Wednesday. The first game of the regular season is scheduled for April 1st at Petco Park with a hoped for 20 to 25 percent spectator capacity.

Dr Ramon Moncada was born and raised in Cuba, migrated to USA alone at age 18 determined to pursue a career in medicine. He finished college at University of Illinois in Chicago, then went to medical school in Spain, then Switzerland, then finished at Rush Medical College in Chicago. He specialized in infectious diseases and epidemiology with the CDC, then moved to San Diego. Here he practiced as an infectious disease specialist and hospital epidemiologist in Chula Vista, San Diego, and Coronado. He retired in 2001, but serves as our unofficial coronavirus expert. 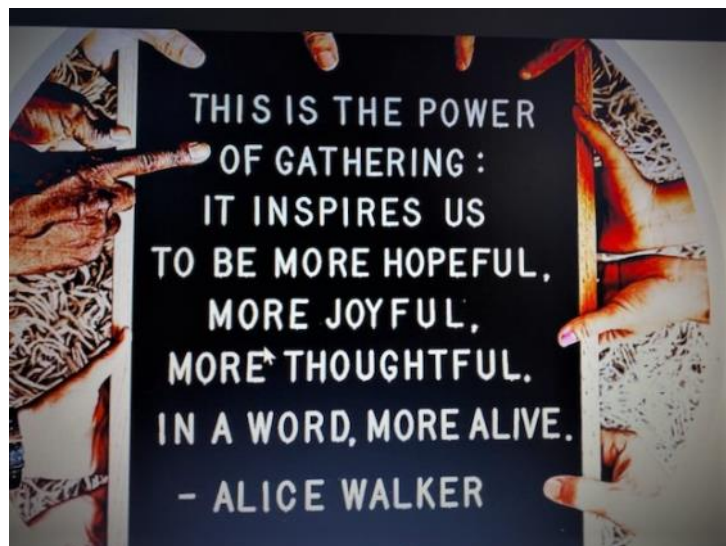
