Master Mezcalier Khrys Maxwell is a driving force and personality in the world of agave. His work with Fortaleza Tequila has led him to become one of the foremost authorities on agave in the industry.

He gave us the history of tequila including the fact that to be called tequila, it must come from agave and be produced in only five states in Mexico. There have been five generations of the same family producing Fortaleza. In 1872, Guillermo Souza, the original founder leased a distillery and sent tequila to the United States for the first time. It has been variously called Mexican brandy and Mexican whisky. In 1949, the first standards were made with rules and regulations to control the product.

Fortaleza is in the town on Tequila in Jalisco. It has 2,000 agave plants and produces 4,000 liters per day out of American whisky barrels for some of its product. Using wood for fermentation gives it a buttery flavor. Every lot produced looks different due to the variations in its ingredients. Bottling and labeling is done by hand.

According to Michael Monaco, Fortaleza tequila is available at BevMo in Eastlake. Free samples were available for tasting at the meeting

- Parking:** As most of you know, parking can be tough in the lot so car pooling makes sense.
- Boat:** Vendetta. The boat is on the left as you walk down the dock.
- Captain:** Ray Summer (619) 985-3563
- Date:** Thursday, July 11th
- Arrival Time:** The captain requests that we show up at the boat by **4:30 am promptly** so he can complete the paperwork
- Departure Time:** 5:00 am
- Return Time:** 6:00 pm

- Gary:** I will collect the funds for the trip and write one check to the Captain for the balance due.
You can give me cash or check
- Deposit:** To reserve the boat and date I am sending in a \$500 deposit. The deposit cost per fisherman is \$40 which you can give to me at the address below.
- Food:** The boat is supplying both breakfast and lunch beverages (water and soda) and is include in the cost of the boat. You can bring your own beer, etc., if you prefer. Remember ice chest space is limited so it is best to not to bring an ice shest.
- What to bring:** **Must have passport, as we will be fishing in Mexican waters.**
You will not need a California fishing license.
Your own fishing rods, gear, etc., if you have them. Saves \$17
Appropriate clothing for the day on the ocean including shoes/boots that can handle getting wet and provide footing on the deck. Wet decks get slippery.
Sun screen lotion.
Cash for tip for the deck crew and if you have them process (fillet) your fish.
- Fishing Outlook:** Will update you as we get closer to the date.
