JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON



Good afternoon, Rotarians and guests. Welcome to the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today's news sponsored by Suzanne Catanzaro.

The fast-moving Coastal wildfire in Laguna Niguel has destroyed at least 20 houses since Wednesday afternoon, where it began in the Alisa and Woods Canyon Wilderness Park. Rising hot gases from the original small brush fire created a chimney like effect letting the flames sweep up ravines and canyons though the over dry vegetation. More than 500 firefighters, including some from San Diego and Long Beach, have been fighting the flames; 900 homes in the area have been evacuated. At this point the fire is 15% contained.

The NTC Foundation, whose president and chief executive is our very own Lisa Johnson, recently received the 2021 Governor's Historic Preservation Award for its achievements in historic preservation while transforming the former Naval Training Center into Arts District Liberty Station, one of seven recipients of the award.

More than 2 million people were trained in the original 26 buildings on the former Navy site in Point Loma. Now, 17 buildings have been renovated into a unique location filled with nearly 145 galleries, museums, artists, music groups, dance companies, makers, creators, and distinctive dining experiences. Plans for the remaining 9 buildings still to be redeveloped include a 41,000-square-foot multilevel performance venue with two live theaters and a 75-room boutique hotel.

If you're no good at taking selfies, Snap, the corporation behind the social media app Snapchat, has a solution for you: the Pixy, a yellow, square-shaped flying camera drone that costs \$230, weighs about a quarter of a pound and hovers around you to film you automatically. After it takes your picture, Pixy will land in your hand autonomously. Pictures are uploaded automatically to your Snapchat app. It's available for preorder and starts shipping in a few weeks.

Padres' manager Bob Melvin is resting comfortably and expected to make a full recovery following successful prostate surgery on Wednesday at UC San Diego Health. It's hoped that Melvin may be able to rejoin the Padres in time for the San Francisco leg of the upcoming road trip later this month.

Suzanne Catanzaro met husband Paul at college. They've been married 57 years this August. They moved to San Francisco in 1968 – saw all the boats on the Bay so they bought a 30-foot sailboat which neither one knew how to sail. 10 years later they left San Francisco on a 45-foot sailboat with a 12- and 7-year-old. Three and a half years later, after a life at sea, they sailed into San Diego Bay.

Suzanne started a computer-based learning center which 3 years later morphed into Bonita Country Day School, founded in 1986 as a high school.

The school soon became recognized for its tremendous success with dyslexic students and added middle and elementary school grades. After 10 years the school relocated, discontinued the high school, and focused on the lower grades. Its students received national recognition for their academic success and high scores on national tests. With COVID came the closing of school. Suzanne says, "I was 75 and decided it was time for me to retire. I gifted the school to the adjacent church and have no regrets. I am now a full-time backyard gardener."
