JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON



Hello, everyone. Welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon, today sponsored by Lane Pearson and the Rotary Foundation.

At a news conference at SDSU's Snapdragon stadium yesterday, Major League Soccer announced that its 30th and newest team will be located in San Diego. Sacramento and Las Vegas were both in line ahead of San Diego, but their projects fell through. The team has not yet announced a name or the proposed location of its farm system youth academy. The expansion franchise will begin play in February 2025 at the 35,000-capacity Mission Valley stadium, with an ownership group headed by the London-based Mansour Group and the local Sycuan tribe.

The final piece for MLS approval was a lease agreement with San Diego State's new stadium. The \$310 million venue, not yet a year old, already hosts Aztecs football; the San Diego Wave of the National Women's Soccer League; professional rugby's San Diego Legion; concerts; motorsports; and international soccer games. Sycuan has been interested in bringing MLS to San Diego for more than a year, but it wasn't until last summer they found a suitable investment partner - the Mansour Group, headed by Mohamed Mansour, an Egyptian billionaire who lives in London and is the treasurer of Britain's conservative Tory party.

The Mansour Group is a global business consortium that owns a top Danish soccer club and started the "Right to Dream" youth soccer academies in Ghana, Denmark and Egypt. A fourth campus will open in San Diego, with the top prospects graduating to the MLS club's roster, and other young players going to U.S. college programs. Not expected to be part of the picture is the San Diego Loyal, which plays at USD's Torero Stadium and is in its fourth season in the 24-team USL Championship, the second division of the U.S. soccer pyramid.

A move by major automakers to eliminate AM radios from new vehicles is underway, despite protests from station owners, listeners, first responders and politicians from both major parties. Some automakers including BMW, Volkswagen, Mazda and Tesla, are removing AM radios from new electric vehicles because electric engines can interfere with the sound of AM stations. Ford is taking a bigger step, eliminating AM from all its vehicles, electric or gas operated. However, other automakers, including Toyota and Honda, say they have no plans to eliminate AM. Industry observers speculate that losing access to the car dashboard will be a death blow to many of the nation's 4,185 AM stations — a core element of the nation's delivery system for news, political talk, coverage of weather emergencies and foreign language programming. Even though the AM audience has been aging for decades, 82 million Americans still listen each month. Of the \$11 billion in advertising revenue that radio pulled in last year, about \$2 billion came from AM stations. And some of the country's most lucrative radio stations are still on AM, mostly all-news or news and talk stations.

OnStage Playhouse in Chula Vista has announced what it hopes will be a brief pause in operations to launch a much-needed fundraising campaign. The Raise4Plays Giving Campaign aims to raise at least \$150,000 to cover future operating and production costs. Rising expenses, including increased cost of rent for the theater's Third Avenue space, were the major factor in the theater's hiatus. In March, OnStage was honored with its second Craig Noel Award for Outstanding Achievement by a Small Theater for its work in the 2022 theatrical season. The award honors companies that produce high-quality and risk-taking programming. "Though we remain committed to bringing great theater to life, we are in need of support from our amazing community," the new board said. To donate, visit onstageplayhouse.org/donate.


