Urban Street Angel's mission is to end youth homelessness by providing supportive housing and job training opportunities to cultivate personal responsibility.

Urban Street Angels is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization founded in 2012 to help tackle youth homelessness in the San Diego, California area. We began as a small group of volunteers hitting the streets of San Diego several times a month with backpacks of supplies and home-cooked meals. We quickly discovered that San Diego has many organizations and resources dedicated to feeding and supplying the homeless, but very few geared to young adults. Particularly, a key service was missing: supportive housing and job training programs for transition-aged youth ("TAY", 18 – 25 years old) to help them off the streets with a hand up.

Good afternoon Rotarians and guests. Today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon is sponsored by yours truly, Betty Waznis and the Chula Vista Public Library.

Congratulations to two members of our Chula Vista Rotary family who are being celebrated in the news this week. Chula Vista Rotarian Dr. Francisco Escobedo announced his retirement as superintendent of Chula Vista Elementary School District effective August 31 to become the executive director of the National Center for Urban School Transformation, a center at San Diego State University that focuses on improving urban education.

He has been an educator for 30 years and is one of the longest-serving leaders to remain with the same district in our county. Under his leadership, Chula Vista Elementary has been one of the county's few higher performing districts that is racially, ethnically, and economically diverse.

Opening events were held Wednesday for two eagerly awaited South Bay park projects: the new Tijuana River Valley Regional Park Campground and the Otay Valley Regional Park's Bike Park, named for former County Supervisor and honorary Chula Vista Rotarian Greg Cox.

The \$14.3 million, 79-acre Tijuana River Valley Regional Park Campground located across from 1942 Monument Road, offers scenic views of the valley, access to more than 20 miles of trails and 51 campsites that can accommodate trailers, tents and equestrian campers. It also features 10 yurts, a first in county parks. These are modern versions of ancient, round, tent-like, covered camping spaces, with doors, windows, bed frames and space for four to 10 people. The campground also has an amphitheater, a nature education center, a playground, restrooms, and showers. Reservations for the regular sites and yurts will be available starting this weekend.

The 3.2-acre, \$1 million Greg Cox Bike Park located just beyond 253 Rancho Drive features beginner and intermediate bike trails, a jump line and California's largest modular pump track — a bicycle course of rollers, banked turns and other features that let bikers ride without pedaling.

Your Chula Vista public Library continues to provide a lot of services and activities through this pandemic era. Library Takeout lets you pick up requested books curbside. Passport services are going strong at the Otay Ranch Mall. Online story times have racked up more than 40,000 views. Local history buffs might want to check out the library's collection of more than 1000 historic photographs of Chula Vista, available online. 


MEETING HIGHLIGHTS—April 30, 2021
