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Meeting Highlights of May 1, 2020 (Continued)

Good afternoon to you, Rotarians and guests, family and pets, and Instacart deliverers. Today's Jim Biddle News at Noon for May 1 pandemic edition.

Governor Newsom announced yesterday that California beaches already opened could stay open, all except for those in Orange County, due to the crowds that showed up there last weekend. He congratulated San Diego County on its coastal cities working out a coordinated approach to ensure physical distance and safe behavior.

Of course, we're not on the beach here in Chula Vista, we're on San Diego Bay. This is what the Port of San Diego guidelines say for bay recreation: It's a yes for walking, running, and cycling on walkways, sidewalks and promenades. Swimming, kayaking, paddle boarding and. running along beaches are okay. Kayaks and paddleboards may launch from beaches.

You may see this as a triumph, a comedy or a tragedy, but one trend during the Covid shut-down is a rise in home haircuts. Hair clippers sales have increased by 186% over this same time period last year. And "How to cut hair" videos have been viewed millions of times on YouTube. One result is the popular hashtag trending on the internet --#Badpandemic haircuts.

We don't get much of a chance to see live sports these days. No doubt that is why the NFL draft, taking place entirely via teleconferencing over three days last Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights, drew a record 15.9 million viewers across four networks, a 37% increase over last year. Fears about technical issues had been high leading up to the draft, but there were no discernible glitches or delays in the draft process, which involved the use of 600 camera feeds. And the NFL raised more than \$100 million for COVID-19 relief.

Some of our members are combatting cabin fever with scenic drives. If you head out H Street to Proctor Valley Road and keep going into the county, you'll find Jamul Casino. While the casino is closed, Jamul at Home offers packaged meal kits created for the home cook by the casino chefs. Each kit includes restaurant quality ingredients for a meal for two to four people — plus a simple recipe to put it all together - AND Breakfast for the next day. Order online at jamulcasinosd.com and then schedule a time to pick up your meal box, cost is \$40. For every meal box ordered, a meal will be donated to the Feeding San Diego emergency food bank. Cloudy skies should clear up today and will stay clear this weekend, perfect for that long scenic drive to Jamul or wherever the road may take you. President Dan welcomed Janelle Wallace and Pam Meisner (AKA Ms. Smarty Plants) of The Water Conservation Garden, a six-acre facility near Cuyamaca College. They shared a video about The Garden and the workshops and educational programs they offer.

The Water Conservation Garden is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization located in El Cajon on the campus of Cuyamaca College. The Helix and Otay Water Districts conceived the idea of The Water Conservation Garden as a response to the drought in the early 1990's. The water districts joined with Cuyamaca College to create a Joint Powers Authority (JPA) that resulted in the creation of The Water Conservation Garden. Other organizations (Sweetwater, San Diego County, and City of San Diego) joined the JPA in subsequent years. In January 2011, the governance of The Garden was shifted from the JPA to an independent non-profit Board of Directors. Nationally known for leadership in water conservation, The Garden has won recognition from the American Public Gardens Association as one of the eight top gardens in the United States for its community education programs.
