

There's one thing you can count on – some enterprising American will find opportunity even in a global catastrophe.

As college students return to school amid the coronavirus, a San Diego startup is helping them stay safe through technology that monitors crowds in libraries, gyms and other high-traffic locations. Occuspace, founded by recent UC San Diego graduate Nic Halverson, pinpoints Wi-Fi and Bluetooth signals from mobile devices, such as laptops and smartphones, within a range of about 4,000 square feet. An algorithm then predicts occupancy at up to 95 percent accuracy.

Through a mobile app, students see how many people are at popular gathering places, thus avoiding crowds and the hassle of being turned away when buildings reach density limits under physical-distancing guidelines. The startup's technology has been deployed at about a dozen university libraries so far.

Based on current expectations, Halverson is hoping to be in more than 30 schools by January as more institutions bring back students in person. Interest in Occuspace has expanded beyond universities to gyms, fitness clubs, and ski resorts monitoring lift line wait times

David Hoffman is the third generation of the Hoffman family to heads up Hoffman Hanono Insurance, founded by Jerry Hoffman in 1959. David has been our Rotary president, chair of the community projects committee, led many other projects, and now is assistant district governor. Well known for his talented daughter and his bad jokes.

Nicholas Sandoval shared information about the organization he founded—Create Purpose—to serve vulnerable children in Tijuana and Southern California:

Learning Programs for Orphan Children and the staff that care for them. Focused on long-term development to give children the tools to be empowered when they leave the orphanage.

Programs include **Technology, Garden-Based Learning** & Caretaker Nutrition Programs. Each is designed with behavioral indicators and tools.

Baja & Southern California come together to rethink how we serve Orphans & Vulnerable Children. #teachtofish

Create Purpose Stats:

- ◆ **59 orphan children** served directly through our Learning Programs
- ◆ Training **24 orphanage** partners who care for **over 2,000** children in best practices for child nutrition and development.
- **124 Volunteers** donated their time in 2019, adding to the number of **community members** that have been activated through out Programs.
- ♦ Working with 8 Universities on both sides of the U.S/Mexico border.
- Facilitated the the attendance of 2 Orphan Children for a 2 week STEM learning camp at UCSD.

The group has received grants to expand their services and have set ambitious goals for the next year.

Nicholas was a member of the Redondo Beach Rotary and credits Rotary with helping him to focus on this as his life mission.


