

JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON



Hello, fellow Rotarians. Welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today's News sponsored by Bob Silvas and The Silvy Group.

Two great things in San Diego this week. On Wednesday, Barry Sharpless of La Jolla's Scripps Research won a second Nobel Prize in chemistry, this time for helping create a swift, Lego-like method for building molecules that is revolutionizing the development of pharmaceutical drugs. He will share this year's Nobel with two others for their work in so-called "click chemistry." Sharpless is only the fifth person in history to win a Nobel twice, also sharing the prize in 2001. Sharpless's latest Nobel arises from his efforts to simplify the process of creating molecules. The older method that starts with complex molecules and manipulates and pares them down did lead to generations of pharmaceutical drugs. But it can be very expensive, difficult and time-consuming. "Click chemistry" on the other hand, is a comparatively inexpensive, streamlined process for snapping simple molecules together to create other original types of chemicals, particularly those meant to prevent and treat disease. The prize comes with a \$900,000 award that will be split among the three scientists.

In other great San Diego news: The Padres are going to the playoffs. They left for New York on Wednesday after the regular-season finale, for a best-of-three series against the Mets. The games will be played today, tomorrow, and if necessary, Sunday at Citi Field, where the Padres won two of three games immediately after the All-Star break in July. Today's game airs at 5:07 pm on ESPN. As they came to bat in the seventh inning Sunday at Petco Park, in what ended up a 2-1 loss to the White Sox, the Padres were guaranteed a playoff berth by virtue of the Brewers losing in 12 innings to the Marlins in Milwaukee.

When the Marlins' 4-3 victory went final, thousands among the sellout crowd began to stand and cheer. This is just the seventh time in the franchise's 54 seasons the Padres will participate in the postseason. They went to the playoffs in 2020, playing to empty stands, following a season that was shortened to 60 games due to COVID. This is the first time since 2006 they've qualified for the playoffs in a full season and the first time while at home in front of their fans since 2005.

In news from one of our other home teams, the San Diego State Aztecs, quarterback Braxton Burmeister is expected to play Saturday night against Hawaii. His availability came into question after leaving last week's game in the third quarter after helmet-to-helmet contact during the Boise State game. Burmeister has been challenged with injuries throughout the first half of the season, leaving the season opener against Arizona with a right shoulder injury. Two weeks later, leaving in the first half at Utah with an eye injury.

The SDSU offense has fallen to 117th in the nation, and to 131st — last place— in the FBS in passing yards. As a result, coach Brady Hoke released offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach Jeff Hecklinski over the weekend. SDSU now faces Hawaii in Snapdragon Stadium tomorrow night.
