Hello, fellow Rotarians. Welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today's News sponsored by Diane Flint Wages and the Legacy Fund of the Chula Vista Rotary Foundation.

The big news this week is the weather, a sweltering heat wave that has broiled most of California, breaking records, and pushing the state's energy grid to the breaking point.

The opening day football game at SDSU's new Snapdragon Stadium last Saturday proved to be quite a weather surprise for the opposing team, the University of Arizona. When they left home, it was 95 degrees in Tucson. When they got to San Diego, it was 100 degrees. Not exactly what our Zonie neighbors expect. Next up: humidity, high winds and rain courtesy of Hurricane Kay, coming up the Baja coast.

On August 30, the Chula Vista City Council approved closing Harborside Park for at least three months. At the council meeting several residents called the situation at Harborside an "emergency" and urged the city to take immediate action so families can feel safe to return. Fellow Rotarian Eduardo Reyes, Chula Vista Elementary School District superintendent also spoke, saying "The reality is that it's no longer a park."

Between 50 and 100 homeless people had resided there prior to the official closing on August 31. Reported crimes at the park have included drug use, violence, prostitution, plus fatal overdoses. Harborside had the most calls for service of any city park, 200 last year, plus up to 12,000 pounds of trash collected on a weekly basis. The park closure could go beyond 90 days. A city-led community meeting is scheduled on Sept. 21 to brainstorm options for the park's future.

The City of Chula Vista is preparing to break ground on an \$89 million, 168,000-square-foot Cinematic Arts Academic Center & Library project, which will be home to San Diego State University's new, state-of-the art Television, Film and New Media Studios Department. The cutting-edge facility, to be located at 1775 Millenia Avenue, will prepare students in all aspects of film and television production, including finance, distribution, and marketing. It will also include a new branch of Chula Vista Public Library, finally erasing a 19-year public library space deficit. The project, funded jointly by city and state, will be available for use by Sweetwater Union, Southwestern College and industry partners. Groundbreaking is planned for 2023, with completion in 2025.
