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JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON by Betty Waznis



Hello, everyone, and welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today brought to you by Bob Silvas. NASA's two stuck astronauts took their first spacewalk together last Thursday, exiting the International Space Station almost eight months after moving in. Suni Williams and Butch Wilmore removed a broken antenna and wiped the station's exterior for evidence of any microbes that might still be alive after launching from Earth and escaping through vents. After some initial trouble unbolting the antenna, the astronauts finally pried it off nearly four hours after popping out of the hatch, watching for any floating parts from the antenna removal that might escape into space.

The pair expected to stay just a week when they arrived at the space station last June. But their brand- new ride, Boeing's Starliner capsule, encountered so much trouble that NASA decided to return it empty. That left the two test pilots, both retired Navy captains, in orbit until SpaceX can bring them home. That won't happen until late March or early April, extending their mission to 10 months.

The Pacific Coast Highway reopened Monday, nearly a month after it was closed when flames from the deadly Palisades fire ripped through hillside Los Angeles neighborhoods, destroying properties all the way down to the beach. Traffic along the shoreline route began moving again at 8 a.m. with just one lane in each direction and limited speed from Santa Monica to the Ventura County line.

Essential traffic only is strongly encouraged while cleanup and utility repairs continue. Proof-of-residence or entry passes are still required to enter the actual burn zone. PCH partially reopened Sunday morning on the northernmost section in Malibu. Reopening of the remaining section in the Pacific Palisades area was delayed as Los Angeles city officials made a last-minute decision to keep the checkpoints in place over concerns of public safety and looting.

In more fire related news - Last week, a homeowner in Altadena, Calif., who had been displaced by the Eaton fire, returned to find a 525-pound bear still nestled in a crawl space underneath his house. The bear had arrived before the fires, and had apparently decided to shelter in place. After the fire, when utility workers arrived to restore power, they realized that a very large bear was there to greet them, and could not complete their work, so called on the California Department of Fish and Wildlife for help. Bears are not actually uncommon in LA's foothill communities. They often get into crawl spaces in the area; this particular bear had been spotted by neighbors in recent months.

The wildlife experts decided against tranquilizing the bear, since he would have been too large and heavy to pull out of the crawl space. So they constructed a trap. Then, they lured the bear out of the crawl space with a feast including rotisserie chicken, peanut butter, apples, and sardines with tomato sauce.

Within minutes, the bear emerged from the space and into a box-shaped trap, which a team of eight loaded onto a truck. The bear was taken to Angeles National Forest, sedated and fitted with a GPS collar before eventually being released.
