Hello, everyone. Welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today brought to you by Bob Silvas and the Youth Services committee.

For the second time in less than two weeks, a Pacific storm super-charged by extra moisture from the subtropics drenched San Diego County, resulting in flood warnings and advisories. This time the worst of the storm was concentrated in the north coastal area and along the 78 freeway. Strong winds blew ashore with the storm, gusting to 40 mph at Camp Pendleton, and 35 mph in Chula Vista and Naval Air Station North Island. Several areas suffered temporary power outages. Scattered showers will continue today as the storm continues to pass through San Diego County. Another storm is expected to arrive Sunday, bringing heavy rainfall through Wednesday.

Nearly 1,300 acres of wildland in South County once planned for housing development will remain undisturbed. The State Department of Fish and Wildlife has purchased and will manage the area where a developer had planned to build more than 1,000 homes east of Chula Vista and south of Jamul along Proctor Valley Road. On Thursday, the \$60 million sale, funded by multiple conservation agencies, became final.

The Proctor Valley land is now part of the Rancho Jamul Ecological Reserve, currently home to multiple native species, with future recreation uses planned. Although the county Board of Supervisors approved the project in 2019, environmental groups challenged it and a San Diego Superior Court judge struck down the county's approval, citing wildfire risks, gas emissions, and lack of affordable housing.

San Diego's popular whale watching trips have an added attraction this year. Passengers may get to see a local killer whale pod surfacing, seen here off Point Loma on Monday. Though it's not the orcas' first trip to Southern California from their home waters near Mexico and Central America, they're staying much longer than usual this time, giving local marine experts a chance to get to know them. Of the 10 orcas in our local pod, seven are females and three are males. There are two mothers with their calves and what might be a grandmother. They may be staying to teach their young how to hunt in the excellent Southern California hunting grounds, home to one million or more of their preferred food, common dolphins. Plus, this year's warmer El Nino water temperatures may match the temperatures they're typically used to off the Mexican and Central American coasts, making them feel at home.

Our sponsor today, Past President Bob Silvas, is a native Chula Vistan and has over 30 years in the airport business. His programs earned both local and national recognition during his time at the San Diego International Airport. He now runs his own private consulting practice, devoted to all matters of the airport business, and has been asked to speak at numerous conferences including an international one in Sweden. He leads several initiatives for our club's Youth Services committee, including representing us on the District Anti-Human Trafficking committee, and supporting our new interact club at Olympian High School.
