TODD PERRY, CAPT, USN (RET) Navy SEAL Museum, San Diego Friday, January 26, 2024 - Noon



Through powerful personal accounts and impressive artifacts, The Navy SEAL Museum San Diego will be both an education and innovation for understanding these elite warriors. Authentic exhibits will showcase the impactful ways Navy SEALs and their predecessors have helped author the course of history.

The origin of today's Navy SEALs can be traced back to the formidable units created during the Second World War. Amphibious Scouts and Raiders were formed in August 1942 for the purpose of amphibious reconnaissance operations. Naval Combat Demolition Unites (NCDUs) were formed in June of 1943, trained for clearing beach obstacles at Normandy.

CAPT (ret) Todd Perry is from Escondido, CA, and enlisted in the Navy in April, 1982. He retired in May 2022 after a 40-year career and is now Executive Director of Navy SEAL Museum San Diego, scheduled open in early 2025. He graduated with BUD/S Class 123 in 1983 and was commissioned while a Senior Chief in 1997.

His assignments included SEAL Team ONE, SEAL Team THREE, SEAL Team EIGHT and 18 years at an east coast Special Mission Unit. Command Tours included: Advanced Training Command CDR, Combined Joint Special Operation Task Force -Iraq (CJSOTF-I), NSW Leadership Education and Development (NLEAD).

Todd married his college-sweetheart Jackie a week before starting BUD/S in Sept 1982 and she is now the longest serving spouse in NSW's 80-year history! Jackie raised their 3 children during Todd's 21 deployments to Asia, Europe, Africa, and Central America – and countless training trips.

Welcome to the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today sponsored by Eric Rimmele and The American Wine Society, SoCal Chapter.

On Friday, the SANDAG board voted to hire co-contractors Deloitte and A-to-Be to replace its I-125 toll contractor ETAN Tolling Technology by early next year. ETAN has been paid millions to operate the South Bay Expressway toll system, even though agency officials knew the software was riddled with bugs that caused incorrect accounting despite attempts over the past five years to correct the software. The broken fee-collection system has cost taxpayers \$10 million in liquidated damages.

The city of San Diego and SeaWorld are butting heads over a legal claim that the theme park owes more than \$12 million in back rent and fees. This week they failed to settle the dispute in federal court. At issue is a long-running dispute dating back to September 2021 when the city first notified SeaWorld it was in default on lease payments it owed for a large chunk of the pandemic. The city made good on its threat and sued in September. Last October, SeaWorld filed a countersuit, contending that the city's forced closure of the park during the pandemic was a violation of its lease and therefore it owed nothing. Failure to settle moves the case one stop closer to trial.

CES 2024, the Consumer Electronics Show trade event put on last week in Las Vegas, hosted some 130,000 attendees and more than 4,000 exhibitors. The latest advances and gadgets were on display, with artificial intelligence (AI) and machine learning dominating the spotlight. Here are just a few highlights – they may seem far–fetched today but, as we know, they might be things we'll all be used to seeing in a few years.

<u>GUID</u>*i*, an AI smart belt for the visually impaired, offers a personal navigation system that operates without the internet or GPS. Instead. it uses dual cameras, sensor integration, haptic feedback, voice commands, and a mobile app.

The <u>Oro Dog Companion Robot</u>, is a smart bot pet nanny for when you're not around. It can navigate your home to follow your dog around and is fitted with two-way audio and video so you can interact with your pup remotely. An automatic food bowl and separate treat dispenser releases food on schedule, or on command. A ball thrower housed in Oro's middle will play fetch, as long as you can train your dog to bring the ball back.

The Cappella's <u>AI-powered phone app</u>, here mounted over a crib with a demo cellphone, is capable of translating a baby's cries with 95% accuracy. It can identify whether the baby is hungry, uncomfortable, tired, or needs a diaper change using machine learning.

Lockly is showcasing a new door lock with facial recognition technology that allows homeowners to open a door just by looking at it, without any keys.

Motionsleep's Motion Pillow senses snoring and then adjusts the user's head position with airbags, decreasing snoring and improving sleep quality.

Troy Ray was our Rotarian of the Week. Did you know he was born in New Mexico? Fun fact.





Paul Raffer Obituary

It is with a deep sense of sadness that the family of Paul Raffer announces his passing after a courageous battle with cancer. He was 76.

At each step of his life journey, Paul fostered the closest of enduring friendships. He grew up in <u>Toms River</u>, <u>New Jersey</u>, where his passion for sports and musical theater began. A Little League Champ later recognized in Toms River Regional Schools Hall of Fame, Paul graduated pre-med from Franklin & Marshall where he participated in football, acted and sang at the Green Room Theatre, and became a member and vice-president of Zeta Beta Tau fraternity.

His path to medicine continued at New Jersey Medical School followed by interning at Mt. Zion Hospital, San Francisco (where he met his wife Donna) and moving to San Diego for neurology training at UCSD, where he was Chief Resident. He had a solo private practice of neurology for decades, his office adjacent to Sharp Chula Vista Medical Center. Dr. Raffer will be remembered as a respected colleague and a highly knowledgeable, kind and compassionate physician.

A long-time Chula Vista Club Rotarian and recent president of the Rotary Club of Palm Springs, he planned musical events featuring the "Paul Raffer Singers," and often volunteered in Rotary projects helping his local communities. A talented musician and captivating singer, he delighted many by accepting requests to perform at weddings and special occasions.

A life filled with family and friendships spanning over the decades brought many treasured moments of laughter and camaraderie. Raffer holiday dinners featured enthusiastic gatherings at the piano and guitar. Local colleagues and neighbors mingled with Paul's fraternity brothers at events from touch football games to weddings and trips, concerts and theater. Paul enjoyed playing golf and tennis, solving crosswords and sudoko, listening to music, writing a book, and spending family time with his wife, children and grandchil-dren, sister and cousins. He inspired others, giving unwavering support and encouragement, his love, and loyal friendship.

Beloved husband, father, grandfather, and brother, Paul is survived by four daughters and sons-in law, Allison Steckley (Brian) of San Francisco; Nikki Whittemore (Mike) of Coronado; Sara Lee (Brandon) of La Mesa; Elizabeth Anderson (Karl) of Portland; six grandchildren: Madeleine Squire (Nathan), Aidan, Abigail, Stella, and Julian; and his sister, Sharon Raffer of Coronado. He was predeceased by his wife, Donna and by his parents, Ray and Leo Raffer.
