

JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON by Betty Waznis



Hello, everyone. Welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today's News brought to you by Cheryl Shields and Chick-fil-A.

The Mountain West Conference and San Diego State have settled their dispute about whether the Aztecs are in or out of the conference, a stalemate that began with differing interpretations of a 'so long" letter from SDSU's president. The two sides have agreed that SDSU will stay in the Mountain West for 2023-24 and likely 2024-25. The PAC-12, expected to be the new home of SDSU, is still negotiating new media rights contracts, as yet, an invitation to SDSU has not been issued.

Alvin, the famous research submarine that revolutionized our understanding of the deep ocean and took the first human explorers to the wreckage of the Titanic, has a temporary home: San Diego. The three-person submersible, owned by the Navy and operated by the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution, arrived in June, and will stay for the next month or so. It's conducting marine research and will hold training exercises designed to ensure safe operation at underwater depths up to 4 miles. The safety of submersibles received international attention last month when Titan, a tourist-oriented vessel with an experimental hull, imploded as it was trying to reach the Titanic, killing all five passengers, and raising questions about the vessel's engineering. Alvin, which has performed more than 5,100 dives, is taken out of service every five years, disassembled, inspected, reassembled, then goes through Navy recertification. The original Alvin was commissioned in 1964 and has a record of historic achievements, locating a 1-and-a-half megaton hydrogen bomb that fell into the Mediterranean from a B-52 bomber, taking the first close-up photography of the Mid- Atlantic Ridge, part of the longest mountain system on Earth, discovering new life forms thriving in the dark at superhot volcanic vents, and providing the first-ever photos and videos of the Titanic wreckage.

Almost 40% of U.S. adults have regular trouble falling or staying asleep. If this is you, here is a new suggestion - dull podcasts. They join a growing number of "sleepcasts" that now reach millions of late-night listeners every month. This new group of podcasts intends to be boring on purpose, reading classics of history, science and philosophy as dreamy music plays in the background. The BBC features the Radio podcast, "The Boring Talks," which has plumbed subjects such as pencils and lampposts.
