**GUEST EDITOR LISA JOHNSON - BETTY WAZNIS IS ON VACATION** 

Good afternoon, Rotarians, visiting Rotarians, and guests. Today's Jim Biddle News at Noon is sponsored by Lori Torio and the Living Coast Discovery Center.

An update by cybersecurity firm CrowdStrike led to a major IT outage on Friday, impacting businesses around the world. CrowdStrike told NBC that it is in the process of rolling back the update that caused the issue, and later said a fix for the defect had been deployed. CrowdStrike CEO George Kurtz said, "CrowdStrike is actively working with customers impacted by a defect found in a single content update for Windows hosts. Mac and Linux hosts are not impacted." This is not a security incident or cyberattack. The issue has been identified, isolated and a fix has been deployed." Kinda scary when the cyber security folks are the ones who deploy the bug.

On Monday, former President Donald Trump chose Sen. JD Vance of Ohio as his running mate. A one-time critic turned ally is now the first millennial to join a major-party ticket. The 39-year-old Vance, whose wife, Usha is from San Diego, rose to national fame with the 2016 publication of his memoir, "Hillbilly Elegy." He was elected to the Senate in 2022.

We lost several high-profile people this week. Legendry comedian Bob Newhart, well known for his deadpan unflappability, passed away this week at the age of 94 after a series of brief illnesses. Born George Robert Newhart in Oak Park, Illinois on September 5, 1929, Newhart was originally an accountant and advertising copywriter. Famous for movies like "Catch-22," "Cold Turkey," and "Elf," he warmed our hearts as the star of two sitcoms – The Bob Newhart Show and Newhart. Rest in Peace, Bob.

We also lost Karola Ruth Westheimer better known as Dr. Ruth, a sex therapist and talk show host. Westheimer was born in Germany to a Jewish family. As the Nazis came to power, her parents sent her to a school in Switzerland for safety while they remained behind. After World War II, Ruth did a stint in the military as a sniper before moving to Paris to study, and eventually emigrated to America. As the NY Times said, Dr. Ruth rose from near obscurity to instant fame, starting with a radio talk show called Sexually Speaking. She was famous for her tag line, "Get Some." Dr. Ruth was 96 years young. Other famous names we lost this week include Shannon Dougherty, Jacoby Jones, and Richard Simmons. We lost a local this week too. Rebecca Taylor, the chair for the San Diego County Democratic Party, died in a motorcycle crash in Utah. Rebecca's father confirmed her fatal injury happened when she was rear ended returning from a cross-country road trip to South Dakota on her beloved Harley.

And I must mention the sad loss of hero and retired volunteer fire chief, Corey Compertore who was gunned down attending the Trump rally in Butler, Pennsylvania. A husband and father of two young girls, Corey died protecting his family from the sniper's bullets.

In more hopeful news, a 16-year-old girl was rescued after becoming trapped in the sand at a popular beach in San Diego, earlier this week. The San Diego Fire-Rescue Department said a group of children were digging a "very deep" hole at Mission Beach on Tuesday. A woman noticed the girl, in the hole and the other children trying to get her out. She notified the lifeguards, who contacted local authorities for further assistance in getting the girl out of the hole, which was approximately eight to ten feet deep. Digging in sand might seem innocent, but if the hole is deep enough and collapses on a person, it is extremely difficult to escape. Research suggests more people die from sand burial suffocation than shark attacks. (continue on page 5).





A fire broke out Thursday at an egg ranch located east of Ramona. The fire occurred near the 25000 block of state Route 78 in the community of Witch Creek. Cal Fire reported a 25,000 square-foot building was fully involved. Firefighters worked in a defensive mode and were successful in containing the fire to the building where it started so it did not spread to surrounding brush. Well done, Cal Fire San Diego...keeping the community safe during this high fire season. Zoo Global is in the news again this week with the loss of Winston, one of the oldest gorillas in the world and a popular fixture at the San Diego Zoo Safari Park. Winston has died after experiencing multiple health problems. He was 52. The western lowland silverback was euthanized Saturday after experiencing several age-related conditions, including heart, kidney and joint diseases. Visitors to the Safari Park adored him for his quirky but gentle temperament, and scientists treasured him for his contributions to a critically endangered species, including fathering nine offspring. This gentle giant will be remembered for his quiet strength, easygoing nature and heart of gold. Safari Park officials said, "Winston served as the protector of his family."

The Padres are in Cleveland this weekend. Next home action will see the Padres face the Dodgers on July 30<sup>th</sup>. And finally, the weather. Oh heck, the sun's out and will be out this weekend. But, for some exciting weather action, head to the theater for the long-awaited sequel to the 1996 film "Twisters."
