#### FRANKIE THAHELD SNAKE OIL COCKTAIL COMPANY Friday, June 6, 2025, Noon

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Recognized in 2025 by BizBash as a Top 25 Industry Influencer, Frankie Thaheld's career journey is a testament to his passion for hospitality and mixology. He began his hospitality career in 1989 as a soda jerk at Ruby's Metro Diner in Fullerton, CA, where his hands-on work sparked a love of creating unique experiences for guests. After spending 11 years with California Pizza Kitchen, he rose to the role of Lead Bartender and Corporate Bar Trainer, where Frankie gained experience traveling the world launching new restaurant outlets. In 2006, he joined acclaimed Chef Trey Foshee at George's At The Cove in La Jolla, where the duo created a cutting edge, culinary mixology-focused bar atmosphere, known as the California Modern Bar.

Over the next several years, Frankie expanded his cocktail knowledge delving into spirit history and culture, and experimenting with innovative ingredients like herbal infusions and rare produce. His trip to New York's burgeoning underground "speakeasy" bar scene in 2008 served as a creative catalyst. He further honed his craft in San Diego, helping open Alchemy in 2009, where he hosted "Silent Sundays," a tribute to the Prohibition and silent film eras. In 2010, Frankie consulted on the cocktail program for Ignite Restaurant and Bar in Jackson Hole, WY, and revamped the program at Hotel La Valencia in La Jolla. In 2012, Frankie partnered with Michael Esposito from Snake Oil Cocktail Company to introduce innovative mixology to a broader audience. A consultation in Bogotá, Colombia, revealed the duo's potential for expanding the brand, and by 2014, Frankie became a partner in Snake Oil Cocktail Company, focusing on growth in new markets and specialty events.

Frankie's expertise has earned him media recognition in publications like Tasting Panel, Food & Wine, Esquire, among others. He's also made appearances on morning television and contributed cocktails to a variety of social and arts events. Today, Frankie focuses on cocktail innovation and interactive mixology experiences, continuing to shape the future of the craft. As a partner in the business, Frankie's area of responsibilities include oversight on creating team standards, HR, training, compliance and financial responsibilities within the companies.

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## JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON by Betty Waznis



Hello everyone and welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today brought to you by Eric Rimmele.

California University State San Marcos is the first out of the gate to offer bachelor's degree programs at Southwestern College. They'll introduce degrees in business administration, computer information systems and cybersecurity in fall 2026, and human development and bilingual speech language pathology in fall 2027, with other majors expected to follow. Courses will be taught by CSU San Marcos faculty. Participants will be Southwestern students in their freshman and sophomore years, who would then become CSUSM students in their junior year. Other local universities will soon follow. UCSD plans to introduce a bachelor's program in public health at Southwestern in the next few years. SDSU is negotiating with Southwestern to jointly offer a bachelor's degree in nursing that would be taught at the new Millennium library.

KJ Muldoon, a 9½-month-old boy with a life-threatening disorder, has made medical history as the first patient of any age to receive custom gene-editing treatment, designed to fix his precise genetic disease. His rare condition, CPS1 Deficiency, affects just one in 1.3 million babies. Half of all babies with the disorder die in the first week of life. But KJ's treatment, which built on <u>decades of research</u>, offers a new path to develop personalized unique treatments for the millions who suffer from rare genetic diseases.

Illnesses like KJ's are the result of a single mutation — an incorrect DNA letter among the three billion in the human genome. To correct the mutation, the baby received a series of infusions made just for him, from February until just a week and a half ago. The injections carried molecular instructions that command his cells to fix the gene, along with a molecular GPS which searched his DNA until it found the exact DNA letter that needed to be changed. Instead of an almost certain death, KJ is ready to go home with his family.

A pygmy hippo that was rescued more than twenty years ago broke a world record this weekend by becoming the oldest living captive pygmy hippo in recorded history. She's alive and well right here in San Diego County at the Ramona Wildlife Center, part of the San Diego Humane Society. Her name is Hannah Shirley, she's 65 inches long, weighs around 450 pounds and on Sunday surpassed the previous age record for her species of 51 years, 6 months and 2 days. Hannah Shirley's longevity can be attributed to top level diet and vet care, and a 13,000-square-foot pen complete with a pond, a pool and a barn. Her daily routine includes back rubs with a broom, sprinkler showers, and a diet of fresh fruits and vegetables. She has a friendly outgoing personality and serves as one of the wildlife center's animal ambassadors to educate audiences about good stewardship, wild animals and vulnerable species.

No shortage of drama for Padres fans this week. On Wednesday, a day after the Padres came back from a six-run deficit to beat the Marlins, the Marlins came back from a five-run deficit to beat the Padres, keeping us from sweeping the series. Next up - a three game weekend series at home against the Pittsburgh Pirates, starting tonight at 6:40.


