## JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON by Betty Waznis



Hello, everyone and welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today brought to you by Bob Bliss and Robert Bliss, CPA.

San Diego State University's multiple efforts to become classified as a Research 1 school has paid off with its addition to an elite list of science-heavy institutions that includes Harvard, MIT, Caltech and UC San Diego, a list that generally includes fewer than 150 national members. SDSU was added to that list a few weeks ago by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, which said the school had met the two primary criteria for Research 1 status: spending at least \$50 million on research and development, and awarding at least 70 doctoral research scholarship degrees.

For many years, SDSU held the far lower classification of R2. To bump up to the top league, the school hired more researchoriented faculty and won more research grants, not just in science and tech but also in humanities and social science. They've also awarded more PhDs following recent legislation giving the CSU as well as the UC the ability to offer independent doctorates.

A new cruise ship line is coming to San Diego. Royal Caribbean, which over the years has only been a sporadic visitor to San Diego, announced it will make 44 cruise calls that are expected to attract 211,000 passengers during the 2026-27 cruising season, more than San Diego's longest and largest cruise line client — Holland America — expected to call 36 times with 144,000 passengers during that same time frame. It will mark the first time ever that Royal Caribbean will homeport here. Plus, another newcomer, Norwegian Cruise Line, is planning to make 21 cruise calls during the upcoming 2025-26 season. It's estimated that each ship that begins and ends a cruise in San Diego contributes \$2 million to the local economy.

The West Coast is enjoying renewed interest with both cruise lines and travelers. driven partly by the convenience they offer Californians and others within driving distance. Plus, the cruise lines that already call in San Diego, Disney and Holland America have experienced better ticket sales in San Diego than out of LA.

A new set of triplets has eagle lovers all over the world focusing on Southern California. Friends of Big Bear Valley, a non-profit conservation group, operates a 24-hour webcam trained on an eagles' nest overlooking Big Bear Lake and has closely monitored an eagle couple named Jackie and Shadow for a decade. This week three beautiful bundles of fluff were fully visible, sitting up and ready for breakfast, all looking healthy, full of energy, and jostling around for position. The last chick emerged early last Saturday.

Thousands of people have followed the eagles' parenting journey and were elated by Saturday's good news, which follows years of disappointment. In 2023, the eagles' eggs were eaten by ravens. Last year, severe cold weather prevented another trio of eggs from hatching. Jackie and Shadow are diligently tending to their chicks, trading off feeding and sleeping times while protecting them from the elements. All three chicks are small enough to fit underneath whichever parent is guarding them. Jackie and Shadow are insulated and waterproof, and their body temperature of 105 degrees keep their offspring plenty warm. You can check out the family at FOBBV CAM.
