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
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GABE FASOLINO

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JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON by Betty Waznis



Hello everyone and welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today brought to you by Ben Koala and Koala Financial and Bonita Tax Service.

On Monday the United States and China said they would each suspend their tariffs for 90 days while negotiations continue. Tariffs on Chinese goods will drop from 145% to 30%, and China's tariffs on U.S. goods will fall from 125% to 10%. After Monday's agreement boosted investor confidence, global stock markets jumped with the announcement. The benchmark index in Hong Kong surged 3%, about the same amount as the SP 500 in New York. Crude oil prices and Treasury yields rose, while gold fell. The Russell 2000 rose 3.4%, reflecting optimism for smaller U.S. companies.

Rite Aid customers, including those at the Rite Aid on Telegraph Canyon Road, can expect their local store to close or change ownership in the next few months, as the drugstore chain goes through another bankruptcy filing. The company plans to sell customer prescription files, inventory and other assets as it closes distribution centers and unloads store locations. Stores will remain open for now, but the company isn't buying new inventory, so bare shelves are likely become more common.

San Diego State University will award degrees to 12,277 students during three days of graduation ceremonies beginning today at Viejas Arena. The five most popular degrees being granted to this year's graduates are psychology, criminal justice, finance, general business and computer science. The class of 2025 is among the largest in the 128-year history of SDSU, which enrolled a record 38,396 students last fall at its main campus on Montezuma Mesa.

The university is anticipating further growth. The California State University Board of Trustees said in February that it intended to fund a major new science and engineering research center at SDSU, which should be up and running in 2027. In addition, San Diego State will open a new \$80 million STEM education center in Brawley in Imperial County this fall. The center is largely meant to train people to work in the emerging lithium extraction and processing industry next to the Salton Sea, a crucial element for electric car batteries and other in-demand uses.

The Padres had an uneven week including a blown lead but also an unbelievable 21 to 0 victory over the Rockies. The shutout was pitched entirely by Stephen Kolek, who in only his second career start became just the 28th pitcher ever to go the distance in a shutout at mile-high Coors Field and the first since 1889 to do so anywhere in a game in which his team scored 20 or more runs. Next up - a weekend series at home against the Seattle Mariners. First game tonight at 6:40


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BIKES & SUMMER SAFETY FAIR—A MAJOR HIT!
