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With a Sales Management career spanning 6 With a Sales Management career spanning six decades, Dave Jones normally speaks on Sales Psychology, but as a mental health advocate he is committed to reducing the stigma involved with Mental Illness.

He offers a unique perspective on depression and suicide and his compelling story may cause you to view mental illness differently. Dave is also a Suicide Prevention trainer (QPR) and is the Training and Outreach Consultant for the San Diego Suicide Prevention Council. His presentation is titled "Asking the right questions about Mental Health."

# JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON by Betty Waznis



Hello, everyone. Welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today's news brought to you by Neisha Hernandez and Neisha's Dance and Music Academy.

By this time, we understand how serious COVID can be for our health, overall productivity and the nation's economy. We're now learning that brain fog is no joke. Recent research suggests a great reason to keep up with your vaccinations: COVID's capacity to reduce your intelligence. Using data from more than 100,000 people who completed online tests in England, the authors of a study published in the New England Journal of Medicine found that those recovering from COVID had measurable cognitive deficits. Even participants who had mild COVID with no more symptoms showed deficits equal to a 3-point loss in IQ compared with uninfected participants. The loss was worse in those who experienced more severe infections. Those whose symptoms lasted more than 12 weeks had the equivalent of a 6-point IQ loss on average, and those who had been admitted to intensive care had the equivalent of a 9-point loss.

The 2024 Nobel Prizes were announced last week in a series of ceremonies and dinners. Out of 12 winners in the 6 categories of chemistry, physics, medicine, economics, literature and peace, 9 were from American universities. The winners are:

- Chemistry: for creating completely new kind of proteins with countless beneficial uses.
- Physics: for pioneering research on artificial intelligence
- Medicine: for the discovery of microRNAs, and how they contribute to heart disease and cancer
- Economics for studies that show the importance of the rule of law and honest institutions for a country's prosperity.
- Literature: Han Kang, a South Korean novelist whose works confront historical trauma

**Peace**: The Japan Confederation of A- and H-Bomb Sufferers for their efforts to achieve a world free of nuclear weapons A SpaceX Falcon rocket lifted off from Cape Canaveral on Monday morning, carrying a NASA probe designed to explore Jupiter's icy moon Europa and search for the building blocks of life. The \$5-billion Europa Clipper mission, designed and built by the Jet Propulsion Laboratory, is the largest planetary probe ever built by NASA.

Scientists have worked for a Europa mission ever since NASA's Galileo probe found that the moon probably has a subterranean global ocean, heated by Jupiter's gravitational forces. With water, an energy source in the form of heat, and potentially organic compounds, scientists say Europa could be hospitable for alien life.

The Europa Clipper is now on its 1.8-billion mile, 5½-year journey to the solar system's largest planet. Its journey to Europa will not be direct. It will get a gravity assist by sling-shotting around Mars early next year, then will boomerang back around Earth in late 2026 before zooming toward Jupiter and the gas giant's icy, dynamic moon. The probe is scheduled to arrive in 2030 and gather data for more than four years.

Bernard and Neisha both grew up in Chula Vista (off of Orange Avenue) in the 1970's and 80's. They attended Rohr Elementary School together. In high school, Neisha transferred to the Chula Vista School for the Creative and Performing Arts while Bernard continued on to Castle Park. The two still saw each other, though, as Neisha drove Bernard to karate lessons on Saturdays. As lifelong family friends, their lives weaved in and out of one another's until they were tricked by Neisha's brother into a date. And, the rest is history! Now they have 4 kids (ages 12-24) and run their dance and music school together.

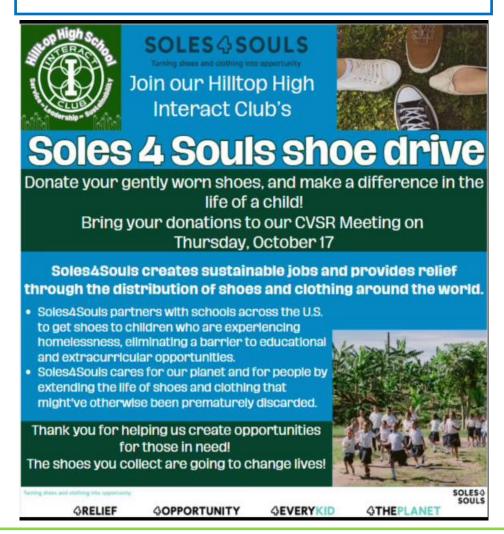




# BRING GENTLY USED SHOES TO THE THREE CLUB EVENT THIS SATURDAY
