

JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON by Betty Waznis



Hello, everyone. Welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon, today brought to you by Cheryl Shields. San Diego's driest water year in nearly a decade ended last week. The water year is a 12-month cycle that begins on Oct. 1, when the state is headed into fall and winter, when most rainfall occurs. We recorded 5.07 inches of precipitation, barely half its seasonal average. San Diego hasn't been this dry since the water year that ended on Sept. 30, 2018, when the city got 3.34 inches of rain. The shortage of rain has produced varying levels of drought across the county, elevating the risk of wildfires at the time of year when dry Santa Ana winds begin to blow.

A remarkable discovery has been made off the east coast of Florida, where divers have recovered more than 1,000 gold and silver coins from one of the most famous shipwrecks in the Americas—the 1715 Treasure Fleet. The find was made this summer by Queens Jewels Salvage Company and announced last week. The fleet consisted of 12 Spanish ships that left Cuba in July 1715, carrying gold, silver, and other treasures from Mexico, Peru, and Bolivia. A powerful hurricane sank 11 of the ships off Florida's coast, scattering an estimated \$400 million in valuables along 50 miles of shoreline and claiming hundreds of sailors' lives. While some cargo was salvaged in the years after, most remained on the ocean floor for over three centuries.

The recent recovery includes more than 1,000 silver "pieces of eight," five gold escudos, and rare gold artifacts. Many coins are in excellent condition, showing clear dates and Mexican colonial mint marks. Modern salvage operations are conducted under state oversight to ensure artifacts are recorded and preserved. Once cleaned, weighed, photographed and cataloged, the State of Florida may claim up to 20 percent of the haul for museum exhibition.

Chunk, a towering brown bear with a broken jaw, swept the competition in the popular Fat Bear Week contest — his first win after narrowly finishing in second place three previous years.

The annual online competition which concluded last week allows viewers to follow 12 bears in Alaska's Katmai National Park and Preserve on live webcams and cast ballots in a bracket-style, single-elimination tournament that lasts a week. Chunk — known officially as Bear 32 — beat out Bear 856 in the final bracket. Chunk's weight was estimated at 1,200 pounds. While contest organizers cannot weigh individual bears during the contest, the bear contestants have had their density scanned for weight estimates using LIDAR laser technology. The wildly popular contest attracted over 1.5 million votes this year from fans who watched the bears as they fished in the Brooks River about 300 miles from Anchorage, enjoying the largest glut of salmon since the Fat Bear Week contest began in 2014.

Beyond their jobs and education, Cheryl is a Mentor Mom to Moms of Preschoolers, Cheryl & Rob teach a parenting class at their church, and help lead the Marriage Ministry. Rob & Cheryl founded and ran A Night to Remember Prom for kids with special needs for 11 years and recently have a heart for vulnerable orphans in Zambia, Africa, where they sponsor 18 orphans and have spent their last 3 summers serving there - and they are headed there again this June. Cheryl is on the Board of Directors for the Zambia non-profit, Family Legacy. Cheryl and her family love to serve others and is proud to be a Rotarian - as "Service above Self" is in the DNA of who she is. 
