

JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON by Betty Waznis





Hello, everyone. Welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today's News brought to you by Rick Richardson and Child Development Associates.

Most fast-food workers in California would be paid at least \$20 per hour next year under a new bill in the state Legislature aimed at ending a standoff between the industry and labor unions over wages and working conditions. California's minimum wage is already among the highest in the country at \$15.50 per hour. The bill, filed Monday with the blessing of both labor unions and the fast-food industry, would increase the minimum wage to \$20 per hour for the approximately half million workers at restaurants in California that have at least 60 locations nationwide, with a few exceptions.

California is experimenting with digital driver's licenses. Residents can download the CA DMV Wallet app on their smartphone and follow the instructions to scan their driver's license, or ID. The mobile driver's license program, known as mDL, is in a pilot phase, limiting participation to 1.5 million people. Several airports, including Los Angeles International Airport, accept mobile licenses as a form of identification. But users will still need to carry their physical driver's license — law enforcement, state government agencies and businesses are not yet accepting the mobile licenses.

SDSU is in the midst of the biggest research boom in school history, an entrepreneurial-driven endeavor that's expected to grow further as it expands from its home on Montezuma Mesa to branch campuses in Mission Valley, Brawley and Calexico. The university obtained a record \$192 million for research over the past year — twice as much as it brought in a decade ago, making it a big-time player in San Diego County, one of the largest science meccas in the country. The current boom is being propelled by many things, including the brisk development of the new Mission Valley campus, which when completed, will include a science innovation park like one at UC Irvine. SDSU is also planning a research and education center in Brawley starting in January. The project has received state funding in part so that the university can train students, especially those in Imperial County, to extract lithium near the Salton Sea for electric car batteries, along with developing new techniques for expediting mining in a region coming to be called Lithium Valley.

After last year's success, the Downtown Chula Vista Association is proud to announce the return of Annual Amps & Ales tomorrow. Memorial Park will be filled with a total of 38 breweries, a stage for local live entertainment, and amazing food. General Admission tickets are \$35 and include entry into the event from 1pm-4pm, while VIP tickets are \$45 and include entry into the event an hour before general admission, from Noon-4pm.

Rick is also a San Diego County Commissioner for the First Five Commission. Rick served eight years as a nationally licensed head coach for the Eastlake High School Mountain Bike Team, and founded the South Bay Composite Team. He is currently a performance driving instructor with Porsche Club San Diego. He is married to Carmen Richardson, with two daughters McKenzie and Cameryn. In his free time Rick can be found with his family and dog, helping in the community, exploring the desert, or driving anything that blows his hair back! 


