The Board also approved Rasha Roshdy and Risa Baron as authorized signers on the Club account.

He shared several events happening in our District 5340 and upcoming Club activities.

The team from the Prevent Drowning Foundation gave a very interesting presentation on their vital work to save lives in the region. They brought information, stickers and other fun items to emphasize their message. Between 2016-2022, there were 1524 fatal and non-fatal drowning incidents. They help with the Junior Lifeguard program which is not held in Chula Vista. Members had several questions.

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JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON by Betty Waznis



Hello, everyone and welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today brought to you by Gary Bryant and the Community Service Committee.

San Diego continued to be the busiest Border Patrol sector along the southwestern border last month, with 15,000+ encounters, followed by the Tucson sector with 11,000+. Arrests for illegally crossing the border from Mexico plummeted 33 percent in July to the lowest level since September 2020, a result of asylum being temporarily suspended June 5, due to border arrests hitting 2,500 a day. The steep decline earlier this year was widely attributed to Mexican authorities increasing enforcement within their borders.

The first of four consecutive supermoons shone in the nighttime skies on Monday night. Over the course of the next three month's lunar cycles, the moon will near its perigee, or the point in orbit where it gets closest to the Earth during a full moon. This makes the moon appear almost 15% larger and 30% brighter because it is much closer to us. Moonrise and moonset are the best times to catch the full moon at its brightest. The next supermoon will occur on Sept. 17 and will be even closer.

Three years after opening in the South Bay, National City's Market on the 8th food hall is revamping. Its new operator Roger Cañez will be unveiling a new lineup of food stalls mostly focused on Mexican cuisine. Cañez, a Chula Vista resident, was one of the market's original tenants and has opened multiple restaurants in San Diego over the last decade. New vendors in the food hall will include: Kiko's Place, a local mariscos truck featured on Netflix's Taco Chronicles, Carnitas Quiroga, whose chilaquiles were recently highlighted in local best dishes column, and other restaurants with acclaimed outlets in Mexico City and the Guadalupe Valley. Grand opening is scheduled for early September.

The CIF introduced flag football as a high school varsity sport for girls last year and it was a rousing success in San Diego County. The quality of play and crowd enthusiasm were beyond expectations. The sport has now grown from 46 teams to 72 teams. The annual California Honor Bowl, an invitational for the area's finest football teams coming up Sept 6 and 7, features three top-flight tackle football games. This year, the Honor Bowl will feature flag games. Defending County Champion Bonita Vista, with Defensive Player of the Year Mahilya Wilson will play Classical Academy at Cathedral High School.

For the past 20 some years, the rare and unique diversity of native birds, mammals, fish and reptiles of the Florida Everglades ecosystem has been threatened by an invader. The Burmese python, a large, nonvenomous constrictor snake accidentally introduced through the exotic pet trade is now considered the area's apex predator. It can grow up to 20 feet in length, reproduces in great numbers, has excellent camouflage, and an insatiable appetite for a wide variety of food, from eggs to small deer. In 2017, Florida began hiring contractors to try to humanely euthanize these destructive snakes. Through 2023, more than 11,000 pythons have been removed by these contractors, who are paid on a size-based scale. Once a year, the annual weeklong Florida Python Challenge gives ordinary citizens a chance to help in the hunt. This year's Challenge concluded last Sunday with a \$10,000 grand prize awarded to the hunter with the most total captures, which in recent years has reached close to 30 snakes. Speaking of hunting ---
