

JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON by Betty Waznis



Hello, everyone, and welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today brought to you by Bill Torre. Step outside the new Gaylord Pacific Resort and you'll spot cranes, dry docks, and huge yachts being lifted from the bay for service at Marine Group Boat Works, the largest superyacht repair yard on the West Coast—and a growing economic engine for Chula Vista. Founded nearly 50 years ago, the shipyard was once focused on tuna boats and Navy vessels. In the early 2000s, that changed when new employee Todd Roberts, a 27-year-old graduate of Cal Poly Maritime Academy, helped shift the company's focus to superyachts—luxury vessels worth hundreds of millions of dollars. Today, Marine Group employs more than 250 workers at the Chula Vista shipyard, a second shipyard in San Jose del Cabo, and a superyacht marina in downtown San Diego.

Roberts recently purchased the company with two investors, is now president and has announced expansion plans to make Chula Vista the hub of a new West Coast superyacht service network stretching from Mexico to Alaska. The additional docks and greater capacity being created will bring more superyachts to the South Bay, raising Chula Vista's profile in the world-wide luxury market. The growing shipyard should mean more jobs, more business for local restaurants and hotels, a steady stream of wealthy visitors who will spend money locally, a stronger tax base, and a very different global profile for the city.

Keeping financially at-risk people from being evicted is the most cost-effective way to prevent homelessness. So the City of Chula Vista has launched the Shallow Rental Subsidy Program to support housing stability and promote aging in place for low-income older adults who are severely rent-burdened. This program is specifically designed for city residents age 55 and older who spend more than 50 percent of their monthly income on housing and who are at risk of displacement. Renters who qualify can receive up to \$500 per month for 12 months. More information at 619-691-5047 or AFFhousing chulavistaca.gov The Living Coast Discovery Center in Chula Vista announced last week it raised a record \$175,000 at its recent annual Farm to Bay fundraiser. Fun fact: The Center recycled more than 90 percent of waste generated by the event thanks to the volunteer trash-sorting efforts of graduates from the Center's Master Composter Training Course.

No wonder this red bird is smiling. The Padres were swept this week in a three-game series against the Baltimore Orioles, who have the second worst record in the American League. Tomorrow our team is up again, facing the worst team in either division, the Colorado Rockies. The three-game series starts tonight at 6:40 in Denver. Today's sponsor, Bill Torre, enjoys doing fun things with his wife and family, and granddaughter. He enjoys his time at their cabin in Big Bear fishing and boating. His favorite past-time is helping out in community volunteer work for various organizations including his church, Rotary Club, Red Cross disaster relief, Engineers Without Borders providing fresh water and power for developing countries, Meals on Wheels and other organizations. His background is in electrical engineering and research; he holds two graduate degrees in engineering. He has worked as manager and Chief Engineer for the engineering department at SDG&E for 30 years, led research as Director of Research at UCSD in the engineering department for 5 years, and taught graduate electrical engineering classes at SDSU for 8 years. He currently has an engineering consulting company and another company focused on aerospace and electrical engineering. Bill looks forward to continuing to support the great work that Chula Vista Rotary Club is doing for our community.




WELCOME NEW MEMBER DIEGO QUILANTAN!




CONGRATULATIONS LOURDES!
