JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON by Betty Waznis



Hello, everyone. Welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon, today brought to you by Rochelle Carroll. More than 300 truckloads of sand from a quarry near Palm Springs are being delivered to a San Clemente beach this week as part of emergency efforts to protect the coastal tracks that are a critical San Diego County rail connection to the rest of the United States. This is the initial deposit of a planned 540,000 cubic yards of sand from various sources, including the ocean, to shore up the tracks in four different areas against beach erosion and sea-level rise.

Before 2021, the seven-mile stretch of tracks through San Clemente operated largely uninterrupted for more than 125 years. Since then, multiple landslides in the area have forced the suspension of train traffic for months at a time. Officials are working together on possible long-term solutions, which could include moving the segment of tracks to a new inland route, possibly along Interstate 5 and rerouting the train tracks away from the eroding coastal bluffs in Del Mar.

Some travelers on San Diego Bay are about to get an upgrade. Two diesel-powered ferry boats that have been used by the San Diego-Coronado Ferry for many years will soon be replaced by fully electric boats. The sleek modern boats, which cost more than \$21 million in total, will take passengers on the usual routes — one from Coronado to Broadway Pier, the other from Coronado to the convention center.

In addition to reducing emissions to zero, the switch will eliminate fumes, make the boats quieter, and have more space for bicycles and strollers. The new boats will be ready to take over in fall 2026 with no fare increase expected. The new boats will also operate the ferry's free commuter service, open to anyone, which includes six trips each morning from Coronado to Broadway Pier and six trips each evening from Broadway Pier back to Coronado.

During Sunday's mass in Rome, Pope Leo XIV made saints of two well-known young Italians considered to be models of the saint next door - ordinary people who did extraordinary things. Carlo Acutis, a teenage computer whiz born in 1991, combined a youthful tech expertise with an intense religious devotion. In 2006, at age 15, he fell ill with acute leukemia and died within days. He earned the nickname "God's influencer," thanks to his main online legacy: a multi-lingual website documenting miracles recognized by the church.

Pope Leo also canonized Pier Giorgio Frassati, who died in 1925 at age 24 of polio. Born into a wealthy family, he devoted his short life to serving the poor while inspiring his young friends with his faith. Pope Leo told the 80,000 gathered in Saint Peter's Square, many young people among them, that the new saints "are an invitation to all of us, especially young people, not to squander our lives, but to direct them upwards and make our lives masterpieces."

The Padres are keeping us on pins and needles with 15 games left before post-season, where we confidently expect to be. They lost this week's series 2 to 1 to the Reds thanks to a couple of very tight games, and last night faced the Rockies for the second time in a week, shutting them out 2 - 0. The four-game series continue tonight at Petco Park at 6:40.
