# JIM BIDDLE NEWS AT NOON by Betty Waznis



Hello, everyone, and welcome to today's edition of the Jim Biddle News at Noon. Today brought to you by Mark Scott and Encore Realty.

Last month, the Chula Vista City Council voted unanimously to promote current Assistant City Manager Tiffany Allen to Ciy Manager, following current City Manager and fellow Rotarian Maria Kachadoorian's announcement earlier this year that she would retire in October. Allen, who has worked a varied career in Chula Vista government since 2001, will take the reins on Oct. 3. She will oversee continued redevelopment of the bayfront, completion of close to 13,000 housing units in several developments underway in the Otay Ranch area and finishing a comprehensive plan to attract more high-paying jobs to Chula Vista.

AOL says it's officially pulling the plug on its dial-up internet service on Sept. 30.AOL, formerly America Online, introduced many households to the world wide web for the first time when its dial-up service launched decades ago, rising to prominence in the 90s and early 2000s. You may remember the series of beeps and buzzes heard over the phone used to connect your computer online. The company also became known for its "You've got mail" catchphrase that greeted users checking their inboxes.

Eventually, broadband and wireless did away with dial-up for most people today. Still, a handful of consumers have continued to rely on internet services connected over telephone lines. An estimated 163,000 US households were using dial-up alone to get online in 2023, representing less than 1 % of all homes with internet subscriptions. Other relics of the internet's earlier days continue to disappear. Microsoft <u>retired Internet Explorer back in 2022 and video calling service Skype</u> earlier this year. AOL continues to offer its free email services, identity protection and other tech support.

A new study from Harvard Medical School suggests lithium, a natural mineral found in the brain, could play an important role in Alzheimer's disease. Researchers discovered that when lithium levels drop, the brain loses key protections, speeding up damage linked to memory loss. In experiments with mice, scientists gave very small doses of lithium orotate—much less than what is used to treat bipolar disorder. The treatment restored memory, reduced the harmful plaques and tangles that block brain signals, and helped cells clear out waste. These results hint that lithium might not only slow but even reverse Alzheimer's-like damage. Alzheimer's currently affects more than 7 million Americans, with cases expected to rise sharply by 2050. Existing drugs only manage symptoms; none stop or cure the disease. Because lithium is inexpensive and the doses required are tiny, researchers hope clinical trials could move forward quickly. Scientists caution, however, that people should not take lithium on their own, since the treatment has not been tested in humans. Even so, experts say the findings provide fresh hope for earlier detection and more effective treatments and may one day extend to other brain diseases like Parkinson's.




### SAVE YOUR CALENDARS & PUZZLE BOOKS
