

End POLIO Report:

Total reported cases of wild polio so far in 2021 = ONE (Afghanistan):

What's new? 28 million doses of the new Novel Oral Polio Vaccine Type 2 (NOPV2) are ready to ship pending preparations for distribution in the countries fighting the Vaccine Derived Polio outbreaks.

The first countries to receive the new vaccine, in February and March, are expected to be Nigeria, Liberia, Congo, Benin, and possibly Sierra Leone.

In 2020 there were 943 cases of 'vaccine derived polio'. This exciting new vaccine should eliminate these cases.

Rotary Club of Warners Bay – Dinner Meeting – 8 February 2021

Dinner served between 6:25pm and 7:00pm • Meeting commenced: 7:10pm

President Barry apologised for lack of microphone/speaker – as that particular room did not support that technology.

Barry welcomed everyone – with special welcomes made to the Guest Speaker, Syann Williams, Rotary Peace Fellow, and RN Rob Woolley, mherv.

Attendance and Apologies as per spreadsheet provided by Julie B, with the addition of a late apology from Kate B.

Club Matters:

a. Autumn Fair: President Barry reported on the progress of the event, commenting that there are now 8 local Rotary Clubs committed to participating, plus many community groups. Barry will now be actively looking for Club members to assist with a variety of tasks on the day and has asked that everyone make themselves available on Saturday 1 May to help. Toni Mc gave a short report on the progress of the entertainment side of the event – stating that on-the-day timings must be adhered to in order to have a smooth run and no "double-ups" across the park.

b. Warners Bay Markets: Glenda K forwarded information regarding the next two market days at Warners Bay foreshore (20 Feb & 20 March) – asking for assistance with set-up, pull-down and, of course, volunteering throughout the day. A roster sheet was sent around the members. On 20 February, Sue Hooper will be attending the early part of the day, promoting support for the ISDA fundraiser and selling tickets for raffle that will be drawn 1:15pm on that day.

Hill Conservation: c. Munibuna Margaret Raynor contacted President Barry regarding some correspondence she received (on Peter's behalf) from LakeMac Council. They have commenced the initial stages of a Munibung Hill Conservation program and are looking for community groups to engage in the consultation process. They are looking for two or three volunteers from RCWB to participate in this process. Barry encouraged those members who have a passion for the environment and conservation of significant areas of our region to put their hand up for this.

d. Club Service update: Glenys reintroduced a roster for a variety of small tasks that assist with the efficient running of the Club meetings. These include: greeters; Treasurer's assistants; the person to introduce the guest speaker; the person to thank the quest speaker; a return of Vina's "Rotary Education" spot; a return of "This is Me" – a 5min chat from a member. Glenys said she would be putting the roster on a "Google Doc Spreadsheet", the link for which will go in each fortnight's "In the Loop", and encouraged everyone to put their name against one or more of the meeting tasks - or to arrange a swap if they are not available where Glenys has pre-filled some of the slots.

e. Community Service ongoing project: Glenys gave further explanation relating to the item in the "In the Loop" regarding the school backpacks and lunch & stationery items. Many local Clubs run a "getting started" school backpack program very successfully. Following conversations with people from "Got Your Back Sista", the Smith Family, etc - it was clear that occasions arise throughout the year when children are needing a replacement due to changed family circumstances (eq needing to leave the family home in an emergency due to DV). Glenvs encouraged everyone to keep their eves open for specials, and 'end of promo' super specials, on "back to school" items - purchase a few pieces and bring them in to the next Club meeting. Glenys is currently co-ordinating this, but would really appreciate another member taking on that role. So, if you have been looking for something to do that provides a significant benefit to our community, this might just be it. Thank you.

Guest Speaker:



Katrina introduced the quest speaker. Syann Williams, Rotary Peace Fellow. Svann had, in her words, escaped the world of being a lawyer to start working in the humanitarian services sector. She spent 3 years in Mongolia, 2

years working with a Street Children's NGO, 1 year with UN Disaster Management teams. Since 2010, Syann has worked with UN-HCR in the Philippines (1 year),

South Sudan (2 years) and Myanmar (2 years). Following that, she worked for the Australian Government in Fiji as Tsunami Response Policy Advisor and Humanitarian Co-ordinator. Whilst there, Syann received a call from her cousin and RCWB member, Toni G. Toni asked her if she'd ever heard of the Rotary Peace Fellow Scholarship – thought it would be perfect for her – and encouraged her to go to the website and apply. From here, Syann took over the story...

Syann commenced by saying that participating in the Rotary Peace Fellow (RPF) studies has totally changed her life. When Toni contacted her, she jumped straight onto the website and applied for a scholarship. Syann heartily thanked RCWB for endorsing her application.

Syann described the RPF as an annual 130 fully-funded scholarships towards Masters Degree or Professional а Development Certificate. There are 5 universities around the world, each offering 10 Masters scholarships of 2 years study, plus several other universities offering Development 3-4month Professional Certficate courses for up to 80 recipients. There are now 1400 RPF Alumni, which RI has recognised as being a global voice for peace. The Alumni held their first Global Peace Cyber Conference in 2020.

Each scholarship recipient must study at one of the international universities, not in their home country. Syann chose Japan and attended the International Christian University in Tokyo - build specifically for peace studies on the former Japanese fighter plane manufacturing site - a targeted stance against conflict and in support of peace. Syann & her fellow students were totally immersed in the Japanese culture for the first 3 weeks - learning to write and speak Japanese, as well as visiting a variety of culturally significant sites. At the end of 3 weeks, they were invited to the local Rotary Clubs to speak for 5 minutes, in Japanese, about their expectations for the Peace Studies.

Syann commented how very well supported all the students felt by Rotary International and by the local Rotary Clubs. All studies, accommodation and meals were covered in the Scholarship – and Clubs provided a mentor/counsellor to each student for the duration of their studies. Syann's powerpoint presentation listed the Units of Study she completed.





She was required to do a period of Applied Field Experience, and she chose Northern Ireland as she felt it was an excellent example of "Negative Peace" in action, whilst lacking in "Positive Peace". Negative Peace is the cessation of hostilities. Positive Peace is that state in which everyone has the freedom and ability to seek and achieve their full potential without discrimination or conflict. This is such a broad scale that Syann considers that, even in countries without obvious conflict, most of the world lies somewhere in the middle sections of the scale.

Syann's research was on "Arts and Peace", the effect of the Arts (music, theatre, dance, etc) in the development of positive peace. She discovered that, regardless of the underlying views of politics and/or religion, when musicians got together for band practice, music and their love of the art took over and brought a unity to the group that seemed otherwise inaccessible. It was on this research Syann wrote her Thesis for her Masters Degree.

Syann was in the Class of 2017, graduating via Zoom in 2020.

On her return to Australia, following a month of quarantine, Syann dived straight in to putting her research and studies into action. She participated in the inaugural Rotary Global Peace Cyber Conference in 2020.

Just a couple of weeks' ago, Syann accepted a position as Senior Researcher for the House of Representatives Committees Office. Syann is passionate about promoting Peace through active in-the-field involvement at community level and research for change. She would love the opportunity to speak at other Rotary Clubs and is already working with the District 9670 Leadership to develop workshops on Reflective Structured Dialog. She also wants to continue along the path of "Arts and Peace", using it to help her research, understand and help promote peace-building with the Australian Indigenous communities.

Syann again thanked RCWB for their endorsement, support and encouragement to participate in the RPF and help change her life for the better. She is looking forward to working with Rotarians and others to Promote Peace and Conflict Prevention & Reconciliation.

Syann fielded some questions from members before a vote of thanks and book were presented by Toni G.

mherv:

The **mherv** van is currently in the area – has been at Belmont on 7 & 8 Feb, then at Morisset on 10 & 11 February. This meant RCWB had the opportunity to host RN Rob Woolley for dinner.

Rob gave a summary of his tours of service, now on his 6th tour. He has given 7400 consultations, with the total being over 8000 when including the previous 2 tours. The number of consultations increases every year.

Rob gave some anecdotes of his times at huge events, such as the Gunnedah

AgQuip, and at much smaller events, such as at Hay which was run by only 3 local volunteers on Melbourne Cup Day, outside the local pub –which turned out to be very successful, bringing in a large number of men for their 5min consultation. Rob says that whenever he is asked to speak at a Rotary Club, he gives a short summary of mherv, sings a song, and tells a joke – and RCWB was going to be no exception.

After giving his report, Rob picked up his trusty ukulele and commenced singing "I Am Australian" – everyone joined in for the chorus (in a COVID-safe manner, of course). There followed a joke, which involved actions so cannot be properly minuted – you had to be there!

Meeting closed: President Barry closed the meeting at 8:30pm.


