

Satellite Club

A proposal was put before the Board to look at starting a Satellite Club in the area.

What is a Satellite Club?

Basically, a satellite club is unlike regular Rotary clubs, which require 20 members to start, a satellite club can form with just eight members, who remain or become members of the "sponsoring" (or parent) Club.

Satellite clubs also give community members and Rotarians the chance to make a positive difference in a club environment that often differs from their local Rotary club.

Like all Rotary clubs, satellite clubs hold meetings, have bylaws and a committee, and get involved in community service projects.

A local Rotary club sponsors the club and provides advice and support. A Satellite club is:

- A way to attract a different demographic to Rotary or sub-group of individuals, vocations or service interests.
- A way to be innovative and re-imagine what we have traditionally thought of as Rotary.
- A way to re-energise Rotary.
- A way to be a more affordable club experience.
- A way to provide an alternative meeting experience, or format, where members can experiment with different forms of club organisation.
- A way to offer alternative service opportunities and membership
- A way to experience a smaller, focused group
- A way to bring Rotary to communities that might not be able to support a standalone club

The board has given support to investigate and present a proposal, presentation and engage an expert speaker to speak to the Club.

A report on the period August 2020 to June 2021 including the tour from February 1st to June 2nd 2021 Particular thanks to RFBI, Operations Manager Les Corrigan, Barry Knowles, Nurse Rob Woolley, Jacqui Dann and Mike Wooller - Web & Video. Also Michael Weatherall and Rutherford Telarah Club members.

Sadly, as previously reported, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, mherv operations were suspended on 17th of March 2020. Much had been done to prepare for a restart in August that year, but the on-going pandemic and its consequences forced the abandonment of the second 2020 tour. (August - December)

As alluded to in our previous report, there were moves afoot to change arrangements within Rotary with regard to the 'ownership' of the mherv project. So while we couldn't be on the road, energy was redirected towards settling the legal and practical changes that would be necessary.

Adrian had stepped back as team leader and Michael Weatherall from the Rutherford Telarah Club agreed to take on the leadership role. Initially the plan was for the two clubs, Warners Bay and Rutherford Telarah to become partners in the mherv project and to co-own it, so moves to bring this about were begun. In the meantime, Rutherford Telarah club members had taken posession of the Nissan utility and the van, and undertook some of the much needed long-term maintenance and makeover that was needed. Their contribution gave the rig a new lease of life. However, plans for both clubs to own the project were subject to legal and Rotary compliance advice, and in the end, the plan of joint ownership was deemed unworkable. It was decided that Rutherford Telarah Club and team leader Michael would withdraw. On the 21st of May 2021 A formal resolution was passed unanimously by representatives of all (but two) clubs in the District to give the mherv project to Warners Bay exclusively.

One of the activities mentioned in our last report was the production of a video about mherv as an entry in the Rotary Zone 8 Conference video competion. The video had been scripted and Rotarian

Martin McGrevy, retired Newcastle TV professional shot it mainly on locations in Morpeth arranged by Past District Governor Brian Coffey, whose idea it was to enter the competition. Rotarian Michael Wooller, (ex BBC and ABC TV) edited it to the prescribed two minutes. It won the competition's first prize jointly with an entry from New Norfolk in Tassie. The winning mherv video is available on https://vimeo.com/manage/videos/443270801 All those attending the Zone 8 conference (Australia NZ and the Philippines) albeit on Zoom, were able to see it as a result of the win..





Glenn has dangerously high blood pressure and high cholesterol



The van was made 'COVID-safe, with a perspex screen, manufactured and donated by Trident Plastics in Newcastle, a new touch-free thermometer to test body temperature and a wrist-style blood pressure machine to minimise touching and maximise ease of sterilisation between clients. A whole raft of new procedural requirements was also put in place and a QR code was applied for to meet government tracking requirements.

Following a nail-biting Christmas and New Year, it was thought that we would be able to get back on the road at the end of January 2021.

And so we did...

But a sad event occurred at this time with the passing of Past District Governor Peter Raynor. Pete had long been a champion of the mherv project. His energy and enthusiasm had helped sustain the team ever since mherv began to tour with its own RN. He will be sadly missed by all members of the Rotary Club of Warners Bay, and by those who knew him as District Governor... Vale Peter.



So, a brand new tour had been designed with clubs agreeing that they felt comfortable with the COVID situation at that time, and the show could go on...

These are the towns in which Rotary Clubs hosted the project between February and June 2021: Rutherford Telarah (Maitland), Belmont, Morisset, Cessnock, Singleton, Denman, Muswellbrook, Dungog, Nelson Bay, Taree, Gloucester, Lauriton, Bellbrook, Willawarren, Macksville, Sawtell, Coffs Harbour, Woolgoolga, Guyra, Warialda, Moree, Narrabri, Bogabri, WeeWaa, Gunnedah, Coonabarrabran, Walgett, Warren, Parkes, Wellington, Mudgee, Merriwa, Quirindi and Scone.

During the tour February to June 2021, 33 lives were saved:

442 people were tested (mostly men) ...


- **a.** 242 people were referred ... "See your GP asap to be assessed for treatment"
- **b.** 33 people were referred ... "See your GP or seek medical attention **IMMEDIATELY** ... you may be at serious risk." (Typically, blood pressure was very high).

The remaining 167 people were relatively healthy although they were all advised to set up a regular visit to their doctor for on-going checkups.

The number of lives saved since 2017 now stands at over **333**.

At the conclusion of each mherv visit to a country centre, Rob Woolley, our Registered nurse compiles a report which gives us statistical information and some anecdotal stories that remind us about why mherv is out there and why as Rotarians and partners we need to maintain our support for the project. These are a few of Rob's recent musings....

"I saw a bloke who came in with his wife. He was very positive about getting a health check but was shocked to hear his blood





He said he knew he has diabetes but didn't realise that the sweet drinks, fairy floss and chocolate would cause his blood sugar to be so high. I did a full (drawings and all) rundown of the dangers of blindness and amputation due to major circulation problems caused by that amount of sugar in his blood. As he stepped out of the van, he tipped his drink out and threw away his fairy floss ... I think he will seek a full medical review ASAP. Perhaps his wife also realised how close she was to becoming a widow!"

"I only had one Category 3 person today (...a person whose tests indicate a threat to life)... It was a lady with really high blood presure and high cholesterol numbers. She has an extensive family history of cardiovascular disease and had a good understanding of the results... her mherv visit was a timely wake-up call as she realised she had not been paying enough attention to her health. She said she would seek a full medical review as soon as possible".



"It's not always about hypertension and blood sugar... I saw a 30 year old fellow who had been bleeding from the bowel and who frequently soiled himself. He said he had gone to the doctor and all the doctor had done was give him a bowel cancer kit. No digital examination had been done. I explained that he should have had a digital check and that he probably has haemoroids but he needed to be referred to see a gastroenterologist ASAP as it could also be indicative of a much more serious condition. I explained that if it's the case, he would at least need the haemoriods treated as soiling himself at such a young age needs a proper medical fix, and besides, he would appreciate the positive change to his lifestyle.. I will follow him up".

"It is very clear that that access to Doctors in the country is problematic. A 73 yr old gentleman came in. There is a doctor in his town but because he's had a relatively good bill of health over the last two years he hasn't been for a checkup. Just recently he was unwell but when he tried to make an appointment to see his doctor he was informed that he had been taken off the books and that he would have to find another doctor. However being off the books didn't prevent them from writing his prescriptions every 6 months for the last 2 years, so he had no warning signs that access to his doctor had been cut off. The pressure on country doctors is clearly another good reason for mherv to be out there providing life-saving checkups".

"This bloke was only 39 years old. He was of Pacific Island origin with high blood pressure and cholesterol numbers. He was a very nice fellow who had no idea his health was so fragile. I gave him a full education session about the risks of cardiovascular disease and the increased risk of having a heart attack or stroke. He was a bit shocked and said he would get a full medical review. He was very thankful and complimented the mherv programme saying if we hadn't come to town, he wouldn't have known his health was so shaky".

"The last bloke today was in denial about his health, with really high blood pressure and weighing over 130kg. He was with his wife and two young kids. I thought he was a bit too off-hand maybe stoic, despite his wife being a Registered Nurse who continually hassles him not to eat so much and to exercise. My education session with him was delivered quite sternly saying his health won't improve by laughing it off. He and his family left the van asking me for any "quick recommendations". I told him if he is having so much trouble lowering his weight, to get a full medical review and maybe ask about a banding procedure as he is only 50 years old with a lot of life left ahead. I think I did get through to him".



The future:

With the project moving under exclusive care of the Warners Bay Club, on Monday the 14th of June (the commencement of Men's Health Week) Adrian Payne and President Barry Knowles gave the club an enthusiastic re-introduction to the mhery project. Several new members knew little about it and part of the future plan is to increase the number of people on the team to focus better

on specific areas of need. The presentation started and concluded with video segments, and following Adrian's history of mherv, Barry invited members to put up their hands for some of the 'jobs' yet to be filled. Immediate Past District Governor Graeme Hooper, had already volunteered to take over from Adrian to lead the team. Adrian will remain on the team supporting existing sponsors like RFBI and seeking



others for specific projects including the replacement of the current utility and caravan with a new mobile home, for which we have already received one generous donation. Other new roles will include 'fund raising' (for operational expenses) Administration, Asset manager and IT support.

Rob Woolley our Registered Nurse will retire from travelling after the next tour ending in



December. Rob will assist in finding a suitable replacement and hopefully go on to remain as a consultant to the management team on a voluntary basis. During his 3 years of touring he has made many friends among the Rotary Clubs of NSW and has received 2 Paul Harris fellowships for his work with mherv. He will be a hard act to follow and we are hoping that when he settles down at home on Queensland's Sunshine Coast he will find a suitable Rotary Club and join up!

Major partners:

RFBI ... generously donated the RN's fees for nursing services for the 2020/21 financial year. They have recently advised that they will do so again for 2021/22 ... We are most grateful for their continuing support.

Rotary Clubs in districts 9670, 9650 and 9640 mostly acted as hosts, often making club donations that assist with other expenses.

Rotary Club of Warners Bay – Dinner Meeting – 14 June 2021

Welcome: After ensuring that we all had a glass of bubbles President Barry welcomed everyone before he led a toast to Queen Elizabeth followed by President Elect Glenys leading all singing God save the Queen before presenting a toast for "Us" and the service of dinner just after 6:30pm.

Farewell Vina C: Sadly, Vina has resigned from our club. She has been a valued member of our club for many years. She remains a friend of Warners Bay Rotary and plans to participate in club projects when she is able. We will all miss her encouraging presence at our meetings.

Memories: President Barry presented an address of his memories about celebrating the Queen's Birthday especially on the Trooping of the Colour held this year on 12 June. He explained that the Queen's birthday is officially celebrated by this ceremony and is an impressive display of pageantry by her personal troops, the Household Division, on Horse Guards Parade, with Her Majesty the Queen herself attending and taking the salute. Over 1400 officers and men are on parade, together with two hundred horses; over four hundred musicians from ten bands and corps of drums march and play as one. Some 113 words of command are given by the Officer in Command of the Parade. The

parade route extends from Buckingham Palace along The Mall to Horse Guards Parade, Whitehall and back again.

During the ceremony, The Queen is greeted by a Royal salute and carries out an inspection of the troops. After the massed bands have performed a musical 'troop', the escorted Regimental Colour is carried down the ranks. The Foot Guards and the Household Cavalry then march past Her Majesty, and The King's Troop, Royal Horse Artillery, rank past. The Queen rides in a carriage back to Buckingham Palace at the head of her Guards, before taking the salute at the Palace from a dais. The troops then return to barracks. Her Majesty then joins other members of the Royal Family on the palace balcony for a fly-past by the Royal Air Force.

The first Trooping the Colour which is reviewed by The Major General usually takes place two weeks before the actual Birthday Parade.

The second Trooping the Colour which is reviewed by The Colonel of the Regiment usually takes place a week before the actual Birthday Parade.

It replaced the earlier Reliant Regent threewheeled cyclecar van. As a three-wheeled lightweight vehicle (under 7 cwt, 355.6 hg) construction, under UK law it was considered a "tricycle" and could be driven on a full (class A) motorcycle licence.

MHERV: Adrian Payne presented an overview of mherv (Men's Health Education Rotary Van) reminding members that it is a purpose-built caravan with two consulting rooms that tours centres in NSW. It has a full time Registered Nurse who, with the assistance of local community nurses, will conduct health tests among rural men. He reminded us that **mherv** was now our club's major project and that we need to build an appropriate structure to insure that mherv continues to be successful in the future. This would require the club to build a team of people including members that would successfully promote the operation of mherv as well as maintain the \$15,000 vearly funding required with at least two

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years funding in reserve. The team roles should include the following:

- General Manager/ Team Leader
- Assets Manager
- Operations Manager
- Promotions Manager
- Tour Nurse
- Sponsorship Manager
- · Administrator
- I.T. Technical Manager
- · Funds Raiser



- The presentation included details on what **mherv** does with three levels of reports recommending actions that the person tested should take. The three classifications are:
- 1 No problems identified;
- 2. Some reason to see a doctor;

3. High blood pressure, high cholesterol or high blood sugar indicates a need to see a doctor as soon as possible.

Questions raised at the end of the presentation indicated that **mherv** had saved about 300 lives during its years of

operation so far and that it commenced in 2008 when Rotarian Tony McKenzie began discussions with the General Manager of Western District Hospital in Mudgee, Joy Adams, about the incidence of late presenting, poor health events among rural men. The main area of operation for **mherv** is in rural New South Wales although there have been occasions when it has drifted over the border into Queensland.
