"WHO AM I?" – (And Where Did He Come From?)



Pres RENEE then looked up from her notes to see that the "youngster" TYLER EVANS had finally shown up, so he was called forward to give us his "Who Am I" presentation.

TYLER grew up in Seattle where he "played every sport imaginable" and was always tanned (which is hard to do in the Pacific Northwest!) In 2005, the family moved to San Diego where he attended Bishops School in La Jolla. College

brought him to Harvard for four years, but after experiencing the tough winters there, he knew that he definitely wanted to come back to San Diego after graduation. He now lives in Escondido.

As a boy, he loved the Boy Scouts and reveled in the hiking, camping, but particularly in their commitment to service to the community. For his Eagle Scout project, he rebuilt a bridge destroyed by a fire. This effort was supported by a donation from the Rancho Bernardo Rotary club.

TYLER was well aware of Rotary as an organization. Both his father and brother were members and highly recommended that he consider joining. He is interested in a larger involvement in the community through Rotary.

Professionally, like his dad did before him, he works as a business broker. He finds the work fascinating, because "there is always something new and different" to learn through the process and the connections he makes.

PROGRAM

Our Program Chair for August JIM SCHRODER did the honors of the introduction of our speaker. JENNIFER SCHOENECK was an active member of Interact in high school and says that her experience in RYLA "helped make her who she is today." And today she is the Manager of Economic Development for the San Diego Regional EDC – a nonprofit that aims to increase the region's economic prosperity and global competitiveness. She directly manages the Innovate 78 initiative with five cities in North



County along the Highway 78 corridor (Oceanside, Carlsbad, Vista, San Marcos, Escondido). Each of these communities is given a special moniker in Innovate 78's handout:

- Carlsbad, The Innovation Center

- Escondido, The Entrepreneurial Nexus
- Oceanside, Biotech by the Beach
- San Marcos, The Education Hub
- Vista, Where Ideas Come to Life

The concept behind the alliance is that it is better for these cities to collaborate than to compete when it comes to finding the best place in any one of the cities for prospective businesses to locate, because all of the surrounding cities end up benefiting when a new employer is based anywhere within the region. And it can help to be thinking in a regional mindset when it comes to these resources. For example, there might be new jobs coming to Carlsbad, but the housing that the workforce would need could be found in Escondido.

The game plan for Innovate 78 is to:

- Build Businesses helping to connect businesses to the resources they need to thrive
- Foster Talent Align the industry to higher education sites in the area
- Increase Awareness for the Region Positioning the North County brand to engage the target audience

All of their efforts are based on a firm foundation of data and research. The group has developed a regional profile, maintains data, publishes reports on various focused topics, communicates their findings, and focuses on city-specific economic profiles.

They hold industry-wide roundtables, as well as meetings with individual companies in order to identify their specific needs. They then help businesses apply for grants and funding sources, such as the California Competes Tax Credit (which tends to be awarded to businesses that pay higher wages and have lower turnover). Through this program, they have assisted 24 companies in securing \$7.2 million in credits, which has resulted in more than 800 additional jobs in the region.

JENNIFER noted that 98% of businesses in San Diego have less than 100 employees. Therefore the Regional EDC believes that it is vitally important to support and encourage startups. To that end, they hold events focused on specific areas (such as for food services and for life sciences) to cross-pollinate their ideas and efforts.

They also look at the other end of a business life cycle and have strategies to address the needs which arise when companies are closing down – helping individuals to find other job opportunities within the region to keep the workforce in place and productive.

We were encouraged to be a part of this process and become involved in these region-wide economic development efforts by:

- Identifying and referring companies which might qualify for tax credits.
- Attending events
- Supporting local entrepreneurs
- Follow Innovate 78 on social media (especially Twitter)

At the conclusion of her remarks, RUDY VAN HUNNICK complimented JENNIFER on her speaking ability. Without missing a beat, she came back with, "Thanks to RYLA!"



President RENEE extended our thanks as a club for her presentation, pausing for a brief photo opp and to let her know that a book will be donated in her name (and with her name inscribed inside) to one of our local elementary school libraries. RENEE then gave thanks to JIM SCHRODER for bringing us two great programs this month.
