### TIME FOR THE PROGRAM



We were then introduced to **ASHLEY KLEIN** from TERI Inc. **ASHLEY** shared the following information about her organization:

Since its inception in 1980, TERI (which stands for Training, Education, Research, Innovation) has grown to accommodate the needs of many while remaining true to founder Cheryl Kilmer's

original goal - to improve the quality of life for children and adults with developmental and learning disabilities. Through support, advocacy, dedication, innovation, and resolve, they have brought opportunity and hope to countless individuals and families.

TERI specializes in serving individuals who have needs which cannot be met by other existing programs. This includes services to persons who have autism, intellectual disabilities, cerebral palsy, epilepsy, brain trauma, severe behavioral disorders, dual diagnoses, and learning disabilities. Based in San Diego, California, TERI has grown to serve over 600 children and adults with developmental disabilities and their families; and employs 400+ professional and paraprofessional staff.

Over half a million of the children with these types of diagnoses will transition into adulthood within the next 10 years. Children are guaranteed schooling and services until 18-21, but what happens when they turn 22 and age out of the education system?

Services for adults with autism exist, but unlike school services, they are not mandated, and there are fewer of them. Combined with shrinking government budgets, the challenges are daunting. The battle to build a secure future with minimal support for these individuals who have continuing needs beyond the school age years leaves parents feeling uneasy on graduation day rather than joyous.

This gap in services is known as the "autism cliff," a powerful use of mental imagery which emphasizes the lack of support which drives the fear, anxiety and insecurity that thousands of families experience.

The agency has been recognized as a model program in the State of California for the quality of services it provides to this population. As a private, non-profit 501(c)(3) California Corporation, the agency relies on donations from the community and foundations in order to continue to set the highest standards and ensure an uncompromised quality of life to this population.

TERI looks to the future by continuing its commitment to set new standards through establishing and operating model programs, conducting applied research in best practice procedures, and offering training and consultation to professionals, families, and other community members.

TERI's two specialized schools for children ages 6-22 produce unparalleled results in student success. Their schools are able to empower students touched by special needs of all abilities - from students touched by autism and other mild to moderate disabilities affecting learning and social skills to students requiring a higher level of individualized support with a 1:1 student to teacher ratio. Their schools are funded primarily through a partnership with San Diego County Schools.

Young adults touched by special needs may be served by the public school until age 22. At age 16, laws on education require schools to develop transition plans to assure students are prepared for adulthood. TERI'S transition services include a life quality planning service and training for families and teachers, training on life planning and adult services, and life quality coaching to ensure students and families meet personal goals across their lifespan.

TERI is embarking on their most ambitious project to date: the creation of a state of the art campus for individuals with developmental disabilities, bringing their various programs all together into one central location. The Campus of Life will offer innovative facilities and cutting edge research in a world-class environment of community, acceptance and empowerment of the individual. To achieve this bold vision, they need everyone's support.

The first facility of its kind, the Campus of Life will be a world-class center of excellence and innovation in the education and empowerment of individuals with developmental disabilities. The knowledge and innovative approaches generated on campus will be shared with the outside partners as a working example of how to improve the lives of individuals with developmental disabilities the world over. Set on 20 acres in San Diego County, the campus will provide an inspired and therapeutic environment for individuals with autism and other developmental disabilities. The new campus will be home to many of TERI's educational centers including the Lifespan Institute, Kilmer College, Learning Academy, and the Child Development Center.



**TOM BRAULT** asked about the estimated cost of the Campus of Life. It will take \$30 Million to build all of the grand facilities on 20 acres of land. **PREZ. CHUCK** told us that he had toured the TERI Inc facilities in Oceanside and that they were fantastic, and he encouraged all of us to do the same. Our President than bestowed our parting

gift upon our speaker, and that is how **ASHLEY** went home with a beautiful planter box hand crafted by students at TERI Inc. (WOW! ... Bet she never expected to be taking one of those home today!) As a gift to us in return, **ASHLEY** had brought us all some great TERI Inc bags, and encouraged us to use them at grocery stores to advertise their most worthy cause.



Then **PREZ. CHUCK** brought up the fact that there had been an anniversary in the club which had not yet been celebrated - and this reporter was brought forward to announce that **THE LACY**'s had just celebrated their 43<sup>rd</sup> wedding anniversary by taking a Caribbean cruise with 11 family members. **JANET** gave \$43 Happy Dollars for this announcement.
