He described this latest trip as follows:



"This was the third in a series of trips that was booked and paid for in 2019. All happening since August of this year. The trip started in Lisbon, Portugal for 4 days. The second day my credit card was cloned, in a restaurant where I had lunch, and I was notified by Chase Visa that it was being used in Japan. Had to stop that. Then I boarded a Regent Cruise ship, 24 days, and set sail to Tenerife, Canary Islands, Cape Verde, supposed to stop in Dakar Senegal but was blown out by the FIFA cup playing the day we were to go in. A slowdown at the docks. Found this online. 27 ships were to have gone in the same day. Over the next 30 days they were only expecting 38 ships in total.

We were notified that the next 8 nights we would running dark at night. There was extensive pirate activity in the area of the Atlantic off of this part of Africa. The Captain notified us we would not be going in to Abidjan, the Ivory Coast due to "Health Reasons". I discovered, online, that a tanker ship had been taken captive with the crew hiding in the caverns of the ship. All communication and navigation had been dismantled by the pirates. The ship was being held for ransom. We were in the same area at that time.

Next was Gambia where I received a marriage proposal from a teacher. She asked if I was Married. I said no. She asked why not? I said I can come and go as I like and be happy. She said, "I have 2 children. Marry Me." I said, "No romance?" Answer was "No time for romance". Needless to say, I was out of there in minutes. Next onto Ghana, Togo, and just before entering Sao Tome I discovered, online, that they had an insurrection of the government 2 days before our arrival, killing 4 and jailing 6. No one on the ship had a clue all this was happening. I asked our local guide in Sao Tome and he confirmed all that I had discovered. He pleaded with me not to say anything as they had not had any ships or tourism for 3 years and desperately needed tourism again. Never at any time did any of the crew or others say a thing about the discoveries that I had found. The passengers were like fat cats floating the waters off of Africa.

Next was Namibia and then into Cape Town, South Africa. The first thing I did in Cape Town at the port was go to visit my favorite place of all time - African Trading Port. Look it up, in the harbor area. It is an incredible building, 4 floors with items from all over Africa, all for sale. A museum now on the 4th floor. This was my 4th time to visit it.

So as you can see this was anything but a dull trip. Met lots of interesting people all along the trip."

Wow! **JIM** was \$25 Happy, and reminded us that he had also given \$20 in Happy Dollars before he left. Also, **JIM** had previously provided us with a "Special Stan Edition" ("Stan" as in Uzbekistan, Tajikstan, etc.) of Shorelines with

TINA ORTIZ started with her tale:

"When Tom reached out and asked me to share something about Christmas, I thought to myself, oh...this should be easy. But the more I started thinking about, I wasn't quite sure what to share. So many memories from Christmases past...like when I was 10 and asked Santa (yes, I still believed!) for a bike and he brought me a piano! I was certain that he confused my list with a neighbor's but when my mom said the piano came with



lessons...I knew it was for me. It didn't quite bring me the Christmas joy she thought it would.

So, I started thinking which memory or gift brought me the most Christmas joy. The more I thought, the more I realized, it wasn't a gift. I kept going back to memories of traditions. Like, picking out the Christmas Tree, Midnight Mass and being together with family.

We are traditionalists when it comes to our Christmas tree and every year we pick a time to go out and find the perfect tree. Yes, I am the person who looks at it from every angle, checks it for freshness by shaking it and touching the branches. Once we find it, pictures are taken next to it and off we go...to have a hot cup of cocoa or hot cider. And there is always Christmas music playing in the car.

Midnight Mass at Mission San Luis Rey is a tradition I remember as far back as high school. We would go to Midnight Mass and when we got home, my mom would have tamales and Mexican hot chocolate on the stove for us. We came in from the cold night air, there was Christmas music playing and we would sit around the table eating, laughing and sharing stories. While in college, my friends would join us and later I attended with my husband. Life changes often lead to changes in traditions, especially at the holidays. When Brianna was born, Midnight Mass became the Children's Mass (with Santa) which was followed with a Christmas Eve celebration with my in-laws. The following morning, we opened gifts together, shared a Christmas breakfast before heading out to spend the day with my family. We knew we were blessed to be able to spend time with both families.

When talking now with friends and family about our time together, we often find ourselves talking about the Christmas memories. My nephew tells me how he remembers spending time with us at his house on Christmas Eve when Brianna was little and one of my high school friends recently shared, that she always looked forward to Midnight Mass with us. It's a memory that she cherishes to this day.

So, when I think about what brings me Christmas joy, it really is spending time with family and friends celebrating our traditions. We still go out and get our Christmas tree and a few years ago, Brianna told me that she wanted to start going to Midnight Mass. Family gatherings now include 4 generations making tamales and 5 generations coming together on Christmas Day...all with Christmas music playing in the background.

These traditions bring me much Christmas joy!"

Next up was **BRAD FISHER**, who had a decidedly different story about their Christmas tree one year:

"My family of 4 and my Brother-in-Law and his 2 boys loaded up in his ex-wife's Blue Dodge Durango with a camping trailer in tow and drove up to see Grammy in Oregon. She was living in a small cottage on a large estate in the middle of the mountains at the time. We arrived very late at night on Dec. 23 only to find out that she did not have a Christmas tree.



Early the next morning (Christmas Eve) Dave and I grabbed some rope and headed into town to go buy a Christmas tree with the realization that we would be stuck with some sort of half dead, Charlie Brown Christmas tree. We drove around Springfield, OR and finally found a Christmas Tree lot. The problem was that no one was there. WHO BUYS A CHRISTMAS TREE ON CHRISTMAS EVE??? We looked around and there was a one tree leaning against the corner of the red and white tent.

Remember, this is Oregon..... The tree that no one wanted, and never sold, looked like something out of a Martha Stewart catalog!

There was no one we could pay. No place to leave any money. So we just decided that this was a Christmas miracle. We loaded the tree on top of the Durango and drove out to Grammy's country cottage where my wife was decorating and all the kids were bouncing off the walls. We all got together and decorated this miracle tree.

I could stop here and it would be enough......

But, on the way home from Oregon, we were in the middle of the San Joaquin valley on I-5 singing show tunes or something. The wind had kicked up and as we were driving over a bridge going over the California Aqueduct a gust of wind caught the trailer. It threw us left, then right, then we did a complete 180 and rolled the trailer and SUV over onto its side. I can still close my eyes and recall seeing the water under the bridge and wonder how many I could get out of the car if we went over.

But, we didn't go over, we were just on our side. With the help of other motorists who climbed up onto the car (car doors are very heavy when they open up), I was able to climb out of my seat and pull everyone else out of the car. Nobody was injured.

That is my Christmas miracle story."

Two stories down, and two more to go. But first we were regaled with an original poem, written and recited by our Holiday Host **TOM BRAULT**. Back to story time, and next up was Yours Truly JANET BLEDSOE LACY:

"My story goes back to the year of 1975, on Christmas eve when our entire family all met at my parents' house, which is the property to the left of ours as you enter the driveway. We

Needless to say, my nephew got to open all of his presents before dinner to soften the blow of his gift of the "pet rock". This is my Christmas story, and also explains why my nephew moved to Connecticut."

TOM had saved the tale of a "truly special Christmas gift" for last, and it was told to us by **MIKE WESELOH.**



MIKE shared with us that his 3 sons all were born prematurely. His first child **MATTHEW** was born 7 weeks early in 1981 and **MIKE** was in Los Angeles at a conference when he received a

call from a relative to come home immediately because his wife was in labor. MIKE questioned this, asking the caller if they might they be mistaken, because his sister-in-law was also pregnant at the time and due way before their own child, who was not expected to arrive for 7 more weeks. The caller assured him that yes, indeed it was his wife LAURIE who was in labor, and that he needed to come to the hospital NOW! Because MIKE was in Los Angeles, his father-in-law, HAROLD CARPENTER, drove LAURIE to the hospital in one of HAROLD'S tow trucks. His second son MARK was born in 1985 on his parents' anniversary date. LAURIE was exhausted after delivery, and MIKE was being the dutiful and loving husband at her side, when LAURIE told him that she knew that MIKE was scheduled to referee his very first varsity football game that night.
