PROGRAM:



VICKIE PROSSER introduced the speaker, Dana Thomas,

from Sempra Energy, the parent company of SDG&E. Most of Dana's career was in real estate and home

improvements. SDG&E and CCSE had joined forces on the CA Energy Upgrade Program. SDG&E brought him on as a consultant for that program. Now he coordinates presentations and some programs for residential users and also some commercial events. He also still advises on the Energy Upgrade Program and he sits in on solar workshops.



The first thing Mr. Thomas did was to give away tickets for a door prize drawing to be held at the end of the meeting for free things courtesy of Sempra. Then he touched on several topics of interest and key questions about energy:

* "My Accounts Online" (which can be accessed at SDGE.com) should answer most peoples' questions as well as offering the ability for you to pay bills and purchase some helpful items. Look there first if you have any questions or problems. Information and data about "My Account" is undated in real time every 15 minutes online.

* If someone in your family uses a CPAP machine, that may earn the customer up to a 40% discount from Sempra.

* Level Pay Plans are available to even out bill fluctuations through the seasons by averaging highs and lows.

* Nest Thermostats can be purchased. They learn your home heating and cooling habits and automatically adjust to them.

* Many of the free items Sempra provides to customers to help with savings, such as showerheads and faucet aerators, may be sent out in about two weeks.

A large number of questions were asked of our speaker:

* SUSAN BROWN asked if online free items were available from Southern California Edison also. A.) Yes, it is a Sempra Company.

* JAY CRAWFORD asked about solar panels and why some companies can advertise that their panels are "free." A.) It is because the 30% rebate is signed over to the company. That rebate amount is what pays for the panels.

* JIM SCHRODER asked what is coming down the line. A.) Rate tier changes, but the PUC has to make the changes.

* BILL DERN asked about how the cost of dismantling the San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station is being covered. A.) In this area, we consumers are "invested in " (a.k.a. "responsible for") 20% of the cost of bringing down the power plant.

* WARD O'DOHERTY asked about the quality of newer generation solar panels. A.) Panels are better now, but keep in mind that their efficiency still will degrade over the years.

Mr. Thomas feels that owning the panels is generally a better deal than renting them.

If you sell your home, some options don't go with it.

* SUSAN BROWN asked about the specifics of her tier plan. She is at $\frac{1}{2}$ of tier #1, which is good. She was told that you shouldn't overproduce and generate more energy than you actually use, because you receive just the wholesale price from the power company for the excess electricity you feed back into the grid. That lower level of payment means that the additional panels above and beyond your usage needs simply won't be cost effective and will not be able to pay for themselves.

* Mr. Thomas reminded us that although the panels themselves may last longer, the main electrical unit in a solar installation (the inverter) often has just a 10 year warranty. JANET BLEDSOE LACY pointed out that the solar company may or may not still be in business in 10 years.

The tickets for the Sempra drawing were won by LARRY HATTER (who chose tickets to the USS Midway Museum) and JUDGE FRANK COXON (who received 3 reduced energy 60 W LED bulbs).

Then our president turned the tables and gave parting gifts right back to Mr. Thomas: A certificate for a donation in his name to Brother Benno's Certificate and a Rotary pin were presented to our guest speaker to show our appreciation for the information he shared with us.

The lucky ticket for the Opportunity Drawing was held by our guest Susan Murphy, but she did not pull and Ace and received the \$10.00 consolation prize. The full pot of \$321.00 will therefore be carrying over for another week ... Another chance for another person to have a chance at the big bucks.

JAY adjourned on time, but without his gavel. Someone was really sneaky and somehow grabbed it at some point during the meeting, and JAY was completely unawares until he checked his "trusty" velcro belt holster and found it empty. Time will tell how this caper plays out this time!
