LOCAL MAN PRESENTS INTERNATIONAL ROTARY PROGRAM



Our Program Chair JANET BLEDSOE LACY did the honors of introducing our speaker for the day who, as a dead giveaway clue, "is also married to our Secretary." Yes, our presentation was from none other than JANET's soon-to-be partner-in-crime Co-President Elect Dr. PAUL WENDEE, who had an impressive list of credentials for JANET to read through before he launched into his

talk showcasing three separate Rotary-related international trips which he and RENEE have taken over the years. But first he had to iron out the kinks in the AV equipment which seemed to want to flash through his entire collection of photos in practically the blink of an eye. (Perhaps it was a form of subliminal advertising??)



Just the previous weekend, our two intrepid members joined up with other Rotarians from 4 or 5 clubs from the U.S. to visit two projects down in Tijuana, B.C., Mexico as part of a "Dia de los Reyes" event. Our club had made a \$500 donation to the good work going on down there. The local hosts went above and beyond to ensure the safety and comfort of their guests, picking them all up on the American side of the border and transporting them to the two sites. On Friday they toured the most advanced cancer treatment facility for children in the region. Treatment at this facility is done at no cost to the patients, and most is performed on an outpatient basis, but there are wards available for more extended clinic stays, if needed. On Saturday, the group was shown around a facility serving handicapped children from desperately poor backgrounds. One of the photos which PAUL displayed showed a 15-year-old receiving his first hearing aid, provided by Rotary, which literally opened up the world of sounds to this grateful patient. Witnessing firsthand the benefits which Rotary can make possible for those in need really can open your eyes and fill your soul!



Next there were slides from their 2017 trip to visit Rotarians in Thailand where they were greeted by more wonderful Rotarian hosts. As RENEE remarked, when you visit Rotarians abroad "they treat you like royalty!" Arrangements for this trip were coordinated by ANCHISA FARRANT through her contacts in the area. While in Thailand, PAUL and RENEE taught English in classrooms for about two weeks, allowing the students the opportunity to practice being engaged in conversation. But this visit was not confined to just their volunteer efforts. Other memories were made and photographed including an elephant ride as well as attending a wedding with 2000 guests and a massive 10 foot tall wedding cake. Wow!

More "Wow" moments were to be had on their 2021 expedition to Mexico with about 150 Rotarians working in partnership with the organization Project Mercy as the group built 10 houses in just one day. The foundation slabs had been laid previously, but over the course of just a few hours and utilizing modular materials brought to the site, this amazing project upgraded family dwellings there from simple ramshackle shacks to sturdy and attractive homes. PAUL apparently ended up with plenty of paint on his hands and his clothing to prove that he had taken part in this very hands-on service project. PAUL encouraged each of us to consider joining in on future international work trips through Rotary. Several opportunities will doubtless be planned to work with our sister district 4100, which spans all the way down to Cabo San Lucas (Baja California, Baja California Sur, Sonora, and parts of Sinaloa). One current international service example: every Saturday Rotarians meet up (either in person or on Zoom) with middle or high schoolers in Mexico to help them improve their English skills by practicing conversations.

Another option for service with an international flair would be the upcoming District Conference in April. Attendees will take some time out during this cruise to Ensenada to go ashore and participate in a local Rotarians at Work effort. This year they will start up the initial work on a project which is planned to be an ongoing effort.

In true presenter mode, PAUL wrapped up his program with a story which gave us all a good laugh. It seems that one of his fellow college professors shared an evaluation which he had received from one of his students: "If I only had one hour left to live, I would want to spend it in your class, because it always seems to last forever."



As an addendum to this program, JIM SCHRODER reminded us of several of the past projects which Oceanside Rotary has worked on in Mexico in the past, including our bicycle restoration and donations as well as our work with orphanages south of the border.
